I suppose what strikes me here a bit is sone of the furniture of the street. Cortainly the width of the sidewalk., and the intzusion upon it of signs, Warren chanbers drugs, cortainly the olock. However, I like the quality of the book stalls set outside...the informal quality.

Certainly they infrude rather carolessly on the sidewalk....1ke that red brick low walks, but they're rathor attractive in themselves. somewhat too formal for the rest of the chracter.

On the other side of the street a great many things. Onorganized assortmen of facades, whil ah, nevertheless, aren't objectionable....certainly provide a not of interest and contrast.

On the building on the right, the use of cast iran...an open quality..
Certainly this stries me as a rathor wealthy street in terms of real estate and it is reflected in the type of people you see on the sidewalks. French poodle set.....although not entirely restiroted to them, but they predominate.

The street really seems to have no particuar ending as wo look ahead into the garden. I suspect the sleight bend in Boylston st, has sometiug to do with that. It just sort of comes to this comer and opon up. The space doesn't seem to be controlled, but merely to flow out over the garden.... In a rather undeternined manner. A barrier to the right with all the other stores.

As we reach this point the space does seem to take on some kind of form. ....the Arlington st, charch has a rather nice setting... from this iimited joint of view. Trying to determine whether the traffic interferes with the opon quality of the garden...the cars really don't help a great deal.
(coorner) at this p oint I soem to sense a bit more organization of this open space. Its overell form becones olear to me...a rectangular quality. Interesting framing...the spire of new england mutual hall at the end of the alley...certainly dramatic...I've never noticed that befere.

Perhape I'flininking too much in one veig...e(oorner) This is a parti cular vien which I alvays enfoy...the assortment of buildings down the right hand aide of the street....particularly punctuated by the church with the rather nice spire...This par ioular ylew is rat or rioh, partioularly vd th the sun as it is now, ahead of us, and some trees....

Nothing I object to in this street, except for an ugly little spo where thoy've out out sone buildings and provided parking. It has a very unfinished look....a gaping hale....otherwi ta waild havebeen nice buil dings.

People on this street even mare then on boylston seem to be of a particula class, because of the retall stores attracting even nore of the upper orus I think a person not of that group might be a 11 ttle out of place here. A perfectly definite atmosphere here, more than on poylston.. This is pret definitely limited to themove weal thy classes. The Brooks bros. but on th man that just passed is protty indiutife...

A very in eresting contrast coming up here.... Bonwit teller in the foreground and ${ }^{\text {New }}$ Bng Mut in the backgrand....two builaings of totally aifferent sceqle. Ibt an unplessant contr st.....certainly indiattive. of two diffornt eras of architcural apitablems and use.

As we turn the cornere you suddenly are faced with a very ugly mass, the John Hancock, whi ch rises much too high, much to out of shape.

The facades ahead of us on the richt are a much more organized quality and a lot better than $\mathbb{N}_{\text {ewbury }}$ street...seom to ite more arranged with more consideration for each other....not a vefy oreative canb.. not better really but it gives a feeling of being built all at once, althoug it isn't.
(alley) This 1 sort of a small scale wall street, vi thout the brass. The same aanyon like feeling and certainly the rear ond of everythint we've seen so far...the f1lth.....not bad odors but certainl odors..... Eonncected with the utility end of buildings. Obviously very little thought given to what offects might be achieved. Same scubptural qualitios in the firescapes which is interesting and exciting contrasted with the drabness of the rest of the area. Particularly as they peer against the sky, a tracery effect.

A tree...apparantly nothing left of $1 t$.
Gee... suddenly the glaring, plain facede of that builaing hit you. (ritz) The gap here from this point of view provides relief from that canyon. I'm sure it wasn't desizned to do that, but it does.

- Always semed to $b$ an inappropriate scul ptural formation on the corner.... a bit too pompous for a humble and actually rather informal park. I'm a littlo unhappy this time of the yaar to see a pond wit out vater.

Looking way off in the horizon, this gives a very nice pioture of the beacon hill sectionk e gold dome predominating. The court house behind it is certainly out of scale with the general charagete of the rest.
