General Information "The first window he wants is the one of the small angel in the chancel. This window to be "Angel of Praise".

(See photo of the Angel window now in place, and other windows in the Church).

When the window is nearing completion, be sure to take up matter of changing the frame.

Description sent with the sketch: "You will notice that I have made it an Angel of Praise, and that I have used blue wings and touches of red on the garment to compliment the color scheme of the present window.

As a further pleasant and significant contrast, I have used a border of white roses, symbol of purity; while the vine was used in the first window.".

Letter from Rev. Byron of August 29, 1932 - "In reference to the window "Angel of Praise" the interested people wish to have a conference with you in regard to a change in one of the colors, feeling that the blue is too prominent in tone.".

Nov. 1, 1932 - "the parties interested...desire to have the window conform with the color scheme of the other window which they have given."

Mr. McPherson is to take care of the change in tracery - according to
Rev. Campbell's letter of December 18, 1935.
