Committee's comments:

"There is some inconsistency in the titles used before the names in that Father Olier is called "Reverend", whereas Father Emery is labeled "Very Reverend". The committee suggests that merely names be used below each of these figures and that all titles be omitted."

July 9, 1945. Fr. Gleason wrote: "I am putting the names of the Frenchmen in French and that of Father Jenkins (full name) in English. - ...kindly make them read as follows:

Jean Jacques Olier

Jacques André Emery

Oliver Lawrence Jenkins

François Charles Nagot."

Four notable figures who were closely identified with the beginnings of the Society of Saint Sulpice and the founding of the College are symbolized in the transept windows under the north rose.

They are, Reverend Jean Jacques Olier, founder of the Society; Very Reverend James Andrew Esery, ninth Superior General of Saint Sulpice, who arranged with Bishop Carroll for the establishment of the Seminary in

Baltimore; Reverend M. Francis Charles Magot, first Superior of Saint Mary's of Baltimore; and the Reverend Oliver L. Jenkins, first President of Saint Charles' College.

Father Olier and Father Esery are represented in the typical design.

Again the vine motif appears, accented with flames of divine zeal.
