This window is dedicated to Saint Rose of Lima, with Blessed Jane of Portugal and the young Blessed Imelda Lambertini, contrasting characters emphasizing, with the first American Saint, the wide reaches of the Order and its comprehensiveness.

Saint Rose wears the habit of the Third Order of the Dominicans and the Crown of Roses. She bears symbols of the Passion (cross) and Purity (lily).

Around her waist is the padlocked chain of her self-chastisement. The devil at her feet symbolizes Temptation, - "the dark night of the soul". Above is the symbol of the Infant Christ encircled by roses - recalling her visions of the Saviour, and below is the flaming rose.

The lower medallion represents Saint Hose's choice of the Dominican Order by Divise Guidance, avaidated by a vision of Christ offering her the Dominican Arms in contrast to the Carmelite Arms proffered by her wealthy friend, Don Gonzales de Masse.

The smaller central medallion is a symbol of the self-involution of Saint Rose during the Peruvian Rebellion when Lima was in danger of destruction. At either side are symbols of the Peruvian and the Spanish soldiers.

The upper medallion is a symbol of the spiritual espousal which took place on Palm Sunday when pulms were distributed to all but Saint Ross. (Three little figures bear palms.) Encircling the miraculous statue of the Queen of the Rosary and the Holy Child, the Mysteries of the Rosary are suggested - five white beads for the Joyful, five gold for the Glorious, and five of ruby for the Sorrowful Mysteries.

Blessed Jane of Portugal wears the veil of the Second Order and holds the distaff for spinning the linen thread with which she made corporals. At her feet are the arms of Portugal with its five small shields, each charged with symbols of the wounds of Christ. It is surrounded by the brown of thorns which she added to her arms.

The small central medallion is a symbol of her government of the kingdom, while her father and brother were fighting the Moors. She was distinguished for abundant alms-giving to the poor.

The lower medallion symbolizes the incident when ill and suffering, Blessed Jane caused herself to be carried to Chapel to assist in the Adoration of the Cross.

Blessed Imelda Lambertini, patroness of First Communicants, also wears
the veil of the Second Order and points to the symbol on her breast - the Blessed
Sacrament in her heart. At her feet is a symbol of the calvary which she erected
in a corner of her garden, surrounding it with flowers.

The small medallion is a symbol of Blessed Imelda's charity to the poor, especially to the mendicant orders.

The lower medallion is a symbol of the Young Imelda's First Communion when
the radiant Host appeared overhead with such extatic

power that "she breathed forth her
pure sould".*

In the principle tracery members are symbols of the Aztec standard, the sun (a Dominican Convent was built on the site of the Temple of the sun) - beland by the sun as a Christian symbol, bearing the sacred monogram. Above are the Llama and Cinchona tree from the arms of Peru.

Across the base is the text: The Rose of the Indies Emits a Sweet Odour.

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The small central medallion is a symbol of her government of the kingdom,

(Short Lives of the Dominican Saints)

*"Tell me", she would often say to her religious sisters, "How is it possible to receive Jesus into one's heart and not to die?"
