Design for Aisle Window in
The Ursuline School Chapel, Cincinnati
(Third from the chancel on south side)

This window, devoted to Saint Bernadette, represents in its two principal medallions, significant incidents from her early life.

At the left is the little Bernadette going to the Grotto with her companions, and at the right is the apparition of the Blessed Virgin Mary in the Grotto at Lourdes. At her feet is a symbol of the mysterious fountain.

Accenting the grisaille field are significant symbols, the Cross of Faith and the Cross of Healing - the eight-pointed Cross of the Beatitudes, and the Rose symbol of Our Lady.

Below these are symbols of the four Cardinal Virtues, the Lion of Fortitude, the Snake of Prudence, the Scales of Justice, and the Water symbol of Temperance.

In the tracery members are angel thurifers and stars, with the Phoenix, symbol of Immortality in the uppermost member.
