Note on the Design for Medallion Casement Windows in the University of Pittsburgh, - a Gift of the Class of 1940.

These windows are designed to symbolize two aspects of springtime with the accent upon the Masculine attitude (left), and Feminine (right).

The suggestion of animals relate to Hunting and Fishing, and the Sports <sup>Track Runner</sup> ~~(Baseball)~~ is balanced by the Feminine suggestion in relation to Birds, Flowers and Slender Growing Things.

These ideas are also complemented by small incidental designs throughout the field, which will be in tints of transparent glass.

Suggestions in very small lettering may record the gift, if it is so desired.

Note from Weber: "See Runner as indicated by arrow on middle page of enclosed magazine. Suggest he be given place of man with baseball bat. Man with baseball bat might replace boy holding rabbit."
