General Information (See design made for north aisle window).

For the lancet-panel under the proposed clerestory figure of Saint Matthew,
"The Ten Virgins"; and under the figure of Saint Mark, "The Householder" -
two parables told only by those two Evangelists.

For addresses of those to be notified as window progresses, see other side.

The design carries out the general scheme we had originally planned, with dominant full-color medallions symbolizing the Parable of the Wise and Foolish Virgins and the Parable of the Householder, - keeping in mind the entire plan. The first - a lesson in watchful preparation and careless security - is recorded only by St. Matthew (25th Chapter, 1st verse), and the second - an equally significant lesson in watchfulness - told only by St. Mark (15th Chapter, 24th verse.) Observing our original plan, the Parable of the Ten Virgins would come under St. Matthew in the clerestory windows above, - with the Householder under St. Mark. I have added descriptive texts inscribed on open books below each medallion. Little angels of Praise and Prayer enrich the upper tier of smaller colorful medallions and the evangelical symbols of Matthew and Mark - the winged man and the winged lion - occupy the lower small medallions. These are outlined by growing vine forms enriching the fields and flowering in white fleur-de-lis for purity.
