North Choir Window
The Frincipalities
Grace Cathedral, San Francisco.

This window comes under the protection of Principalities, third choir of the Angelic Hierarchy, concerned with nations and their devotion to heavenly principles.

The dominant figure in the rose is in armor and surcoat with the palm as symbol. The wings are blue, the color of heavenly contemplation, as are the wings of the surrounding choir of cherubim. Five pointed stars of the New Testament, - symbols of heavenly steadfastness enrich the tracery members at either side.

The lancets below are devoted to Saint Dunst n and Saint Frideswide.

Seint Dunstan, in Archibishop's robes, holds a peal of bells as

artificer in metal and to signify his interest in music; while in the

quatratoil above, the palette and b ushes suggest his ability as a painter,

all of which justify his selection as patron of craftsmen.

Significant incidents from his legends are represented in the medallions below: the angel playing upon the harp which hung on the well of his cell, while Dunstan sat reading his acriptures, and below, seizing the tempting devil's nose with the red hot pinchers, as he worked at his forge.

Saint Frideswide, the legendary foundress of the monastery at Oxford, bears the abbess' staff and book inscribed with the seal of Oxford. In the quatrefoil above, heritraditional symbol of the ox again appears.

The medallions are devoted to the incident of the leper healed by
Saint Frige wide, and below, her escape with two nuns from the Prince who
Whehed to marry her. An angel rows them to Abingdon.
