General Information The subjects on one side to be certain towers, and on the other side, certain doorways, as selected by the Owner. (See other side).  
8 smaller aisle windows - 4 east and 4 west - 7 1/2' each. In four of the windows they want to use the towers of four churches of particular significance to them - including their own tower. Use space above vent for tower. See print of tower which Mr. Godfrey sent. O.F.S. told Mr. Godfrey that adding the towers would add about \$300 to the cost of each window. The other 4 aisle windows to have famous gates.\*  
Note: We estimated it would take about 2 months to set the chapel windows complete, - not including the removal from the old Chapel - just the installation of all the windows. (Turner Construction Company, Com. 4400).

Mr. Hoyle came to the studio today.

Besides the main symbols of the Towers and Gates, the eight aisle windows will include coats of arms.

For the Tower of Christ Church College (the octagonal one), will be the arms of the college, - or Oxford?

For the Tower of Cokesbury College, - the arms of Maryland.

For the Tower of Wesleyan, - the arms of Connecticut.

And, if they use the replica of the Old Boston Stump, - the arms of Old Boston.

For the doorway of King Solomon's Temple, Hoyle suggests the Star of David.

For the doorway of Saint Peter's, the Papal Arms - crossed keys, tiara, etc.

For the doorway of Wittenberg Cathedral- the Wittenberg arms.

For the doorway of City Road Chapel, London, Hoyle is going to see if it was in the Old London, in which case we would use the Old London arms, which he thinks is a sword or crossed swords.

Hoyle is going to find out what we should use in the narthex screen - whether it should be clear or transparent.

He will also plan to take up the matter of subject for the rose. He thinks it will be a large figure of Christ - something like the Evanston.

The Aisle Windows,  
Theological School Chapel,  
Boston University.

These windows are designed in light silvery glass of interesting pattern and texture to admit an abundance of illumination. Each lancet is devoted to a significant tower or doorway designed in the upper part of the rectangular field with related arms and seals below.

The towers are represented in the east side: First, the tower of Christ Church College, Oxford, with the shield of the College below; second, Cokesbury College with the seal of the Methodist Church below; third, the tower of Wesleyan University with its seal; and fourth, the tower of ~~Saint Botolph's Church in Boston, England~~ <sup>Boston University</sup>, with the ~~seal~~ <sup>arms</sup> of Boston University.

The doorways on the west side begin with number one, Solomon's Temple, with the "Star of David" below; second, the doorway to Saint Peter's in Rome, with the Papal Arms in the lower part; third, the Wittenberg Cathedral, with the <sup>(Be sure of the arms of Wittenberg. see report 6/7/49)</sup> Arms of the town of Wittenberg; and fourth, the entrance to City Road Chapel, with Arms of the City of London.
