General Information Window to be devoted to Saint Stephen.

To have a fine figure of the proto-martyr, St. Stephen, at the center, "full of faith and of the Holy Ghost". At the left, suggest the choosing of St. Stephen. "And when they had prayed, they laid their hands on them." Of course we can include only a few of his companions. At the right, his martyrdom, kneeling and looking up at the vision of God, "Lord Jesus receive my spirit."

In the top of the center panel include a crown, suggestive of the Greek root of the name Stephen. In the upper left portion of the right-hand medallion, include Stephen's vision of the glory of God and "Jesus standing on the right hand of God" (Acts 7:55).

On the left-hand medallion, St. Stephen's ministrations to the widows and to the poor recorded in Acts 6. Inscription - "Behold, I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing on the right hand of God." Acts 56.

is planned, it is devoted to Saint Stephen. The protomartyr is represented at the center, with the book and palm of martyrdom. The symbol of the crown above suggests the Greek root of his name, as well as the heavenly crown.

At the left, Saint Stephen ministers to the widows and the poor, as recorded in Acts 6.

At the right is his martyrdom. While being stoned, Saint Stephen kneels in prayer looking up at the vision of God, "Lord Jesus receive my spirit".

The text reads, "Behold, I see the heavens opened and the Son of Man standing on the right hand of God." (Acts 7:55).

The decorative foliated fields and ruby borders are accented with stars of heavenly steadfastness.

Across the base a space is designed for the memorial inscription.
