General Information Christ as the Shepherd in center panel, Grapes in one side panel, and Wheat in the other.

They like the Altar window in Missoula, but want only one central figure.

(See letter of October 1, 1948 for subject and price suggestions for other windows in the church.)

"...We have represented Christ the Good Shepherd as the dominant central figure. He holds the lamb and shepherd's crook, and is robed in ruby and white, the traditional colors of divine love and purity. In the side panels are the sacramental symbols of grape and wheat. Growing foliated vine forms enrich the field and add notes of silver and gold with touches of green to the basic rubies and blues. .

"A space at the base is provided for a possible memorial inscription, but if this is not required, the position might be occupied by a significant text such as - "I am the Good Shepherd", or an ornamental pattern."
