Fairly simple field to admit good light.

We have completed the color sketch for the Saint Luke window, and are sending it to you herewith.

We all think it has worked out very well, with Saint Luke as the dominant figure, holding his symbol of the caduceus as "the beloved physician".

Below is his traditional evangelical symbol, the winged ox.

At the left is suggested his companionship with Saint Paul as he visits him in prison.

At the right we have again followed tradition in the legend that he was also a painter and painted the portrait of the Blessed Virgin.

The color scheme works out in a harmonious manner with the other windows, and we are confident that it will serve beautifully to further enrich your church.
