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Dr. Hine especially likes our window in the First Unitarian Church of Philadelphia; and the right and left lancets of the aisle window in Saint Chrysostom's, Chicago.

Following are his suggestions for the nave windows:

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"As I suggested, I like very much the right and left sections of the south aisle window in Saint Chrysostom's Church in Chicago. My original thought was to have a scene of about this size, perhaps in La round medallion instead of a comena fathe

The reven temple lappe are indicated around the figure of the young Christ surrounded by the Doctors in the furtrafoil, while the outer field is enriched with symbols of the Old and New Testaments, the Tublets of Moses, the Lamb of God supported by the look of New n Seals, the Globe surpounted by the Cross of milying Our Lord's domination over the works, and the lamp of revealed knowledge.

The state of the s Growing grapsvines enrich the field and outline that modellions, suggesting the significant text, "I on the Wine, ye are the branches".

We like the idea of single figures and related modelitons in light silvery fields for the stale windows. The typical sketch is devoted to John Know and John Calvin. The broken fetters recall his suffering from the irons and lash of a French galley.

In the medallion below, he is represented preaching before Hery, Queen of Scots.

The significent text on the open book below is from Know's writings, Merchandise have I not and of the glorious ovingel of Jesus Christ".

In the medallion of the Calvin panel, he is represented in his significant presching at Geneva; and the text is from a letter to Cranner, "I should cross ten seas if Holy Communion might preveil among the members of Christ". Parhaps you will have in aince texts that you would particularly like to use here.

The tracery namber is enriched with the torch of zeal of Protestant Reformers.

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Following are his suggestions for the nave windows:

"As I suggested, I like very much the right and left sections of the south aisle window in Saint Chrysostom's Church in Chicago. original thought was to have a scene of about this size, perhaps a round medallion instead of a square for each of our windows. The idea of white a bit of white space around the medallion.

My second choice would be the east nave window in the First Unitarian Church, Philadelphia. ... the students would like the scene better than the single figure. It would mean more to them.

Of course, the single figure can be treated in such a way that the significance of a person's work can be illustrated.

Suggestions for 2 windows would be to have one in which John Knox is pictured and John Calvin in the other. The second would be two figures that were very prominent in the early history of the Presbyterian Church, here in America. One is Francis Makemie; a good man to team with him would be John Witherspoon, early president of Princeton College, and also a signer of the

Declaration of Independence."

Make new typical design - keeping price down as near as possible to \$1800 each window. We feel that the principal figures should be represented in each window perhaps making them considerably smaller than they are in our first sketch. The theme of the entire church is "Christ's Call to service and those who followed Him". The front aisle window on the east would be the disciple window with Matthew and John represented in it. Opposite on the west, working toward the back, would be the Augustine and early church window, and opposite on the west, the St. Francis and contemporaries window, perhaps using symbols of Augustine's time and contemporaries in one and picture of him in a given situation in the other panel. The same thing would be used in the treatment of the St. Francis window. The next window, working back on the east, would be the Calvin-Knox window, and opposite, on the west, the Zwingle-Luther window these sections representing the Reformation.

In the medallion below, he is represented preaching before Hary, queen of Scots.

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The tracery member is enriched with the torch of seal of Protestant Reformers.

Note: develop rest of designs "in action medallions" 5:15/52 and 6/12/52. We have taken the first window from the chancel on the east for our theme, with Tigures and symbols of Saint John and Saint Matthew.

In a very light simple field, we have represented their evangelical symbols, the eagle and the winged man, and their apostolic symbols, the chalice and dragon or serpent, and the jurse of money.

Above the principal medallions are knowling members of the heavenly chair, with trumpets, - angels of praise; and in the tracery member, the censer, symbolic of prayer.

The border is designed in the grapovine motif, suggesting Christ and His Church and the text, "I am the Vine, ye are the branches."

Just as we were finishing this sketch and again studying your suggestions, I think we finally came to a realisation of what you have in sind for these figures; that is, the idea of their doing things to bring out the significance of their work. And so we have prepared alternate suggestions for the tominant modellions rather than having them holding their evengelistic books and pens.

The rough additional suggestions represent Saint John with his net at the time of his calling to be one of the fishers of sen; and Saint Matthew with his records and funds as collector of customs.)

I think this same plan would work out very well throughout the entire series, and we are very enthusiastic about it. If you like the idea, we shall be gled to develop it in others of the series. It works in beautifully with the over-all theme of Christ's Call to Service and Those who Follow Him.
