


Vestibule window near the Chapel.

It is designed as an invitation and a welcome to worship. The dominant figures represent a modern Pastor with the open book, and a figure of Our Lord with upraised hand in the attitude of the teacher.

Smaller medallions around them are devoted to Christian worship and service for all people. In the left panel at the top Baptism and Communion are represented, and below, Marriage and Burial. And at the right, the child and the older youth, - the family group and the aged.

All are woven together with a growing foliated vine flowering in the white fleur-de-lis of purity. The white background is accented with flames of divine seal.

Across the base are the texts, - "Surely the Lord is in this place" (Genesis 28:16) and "Worship Him in spirit and in truth" rohn 4:24).

Destructive ideas. 1.We feel it is presuming and disturbing to balance the figure of a modern minister, however treated, with the figure of Christ. John Wesley might be used but some even questi that: 2. It was felt that too much space is devoted to foliate, etc. We would prefer to see this developed into smaller medallions or in glass in interesting pattern. The conspicuous motion of the

vines seems unnecessary.

Chapel Vestibule Windows

"...sending several rough sketches involving many of the proposed themes.

A introduced John Wesley with smaller figures symbolizing marriage and burial, the shell of baptism, and the communion chalice, with a guardian angel bearing the text, - "Surely the Lord is in this place".

In B, Asbury takes the central position, preaching to the aged and to a family group. The architectural canopy conveys some suggestion of the Church tower, and two angels bear the scroll inscribed, - "Worship him in spirit and in truth."

The dominant figure in C might be either Wesley or Asbury, and here the marriage ceremony is suggested in the upper portion with the burial service below.

D suggests medallions more like the children's windows under the balcony, with a minister teaching children and preaching to the aged.

The companion panel could be designed in a similar manner with the marriage and burial serfices. Appropriate texts may well be included.

I hope these rough sketches may help toclarify the problem. We are including the original sketch for comparison. Of course the figures of Wesley and Asbury could very well be included here.

Latest plan - Modern Interpretation Design will be planned according to the rough sketch D, and
the themes will be the modern practice of Baptism, Marriage,
Communion and Teaching. If we can get some little figure
symbols in the fields suggesting the Baptism of Christ, the
Marriage at Cana, the Last Supper; and the Sermon on the
Mount, so much the better.

"...The dominant themes set forth modern aspects of worship and service, complemented by related symbols and Biblical incidents through the fields surrounding the medallions. We tried to develop the plan for dominant Biblical incidents, but it did not work out well, and this seems to be a much better solution of the problem.

The design and composition recalls the windows under the balcony in the main Church, but with less foliated pattern through the fields, making room for the Biblical incidents.

The upper left medallion is devoted to Baptism, the one below to Marriage, the upper right to Communion, and below, - Teaching.

The upper and lower medallions are joined by the flame, symbol of divine inspiration and zeal.

Through the foliated fields are the shall of Baptism, the eight-pointed star of the Beatitudes, joined rings, the chalice, the Chi Rho monogram of Our Lord, and the lamp of learning and enlightenment.

In the fields between the medallinns are suggested the Baptism of Our Lord by Saint John the Baptist, the Sermon on the Mount, the Marriage Feast at Cans when Our Lord turned water to wine, and the Last Supper.
