Subject to your judgment, Mrs. Haws would like sapphire blue to be the predominating color in her window."

North Aisle Window nearest the Chancel,
the Haws Memorial,
Saint James Church,
Knoxville, Tennessee

This window celebrates two great Evangelists, Saint Mark and Saint Luke. Both hold the traditional Evangelistic pen and book, Saint Mark's being open and Saint Luke's closed.

On the shields below, are their Evangelistic symbols, ^{LION} the winged ~~man~~ for Saint Mark and the winged ox for Saint Luke.

Sapphire blue is the predominant color.

Across the base is the memorial inscription,
"To the glory of God and in loving memory of Kenneth Haws".

Note: Mrs. Haws has an aversion to red. Hold the red down to a minimum, keeping it dark and not at all prominent. Also change the tone of the trefoil, making it definitely blue, with accents of gold. Mrs. Haws loved the dark sapphire blue. Reduce the size of the red borders by using an uneven lead.

IMPORTANT NOTE: 4/18/57. O.E.S. reports: Our north window nearest the chancel is too dark, especially in the blues. The other one is just right. We should keep the rest of these north windows light (I have spoken to Edmund, who is cutting them now.).
