Staging Blueprints General Information Three medallions a panel: One window to be devoted to The Preparation, with the Nativity at base, the Boy in Temple middle. and Baptism, at top, in one panel; in the other panel, Teaching Zaccheus, or Woman of Samaria at base, The Healing of the Leper in the middle medallion, and the Transfiguration or one of the Miracles at the top. This panel devoted to the Ministry. In the second window - the first panel devoted to The Passion, with the Last Supper at the base; Gethsemane or trial in the center, and the Crucirixion at the top;; In the second panel, dewoted to the Resurrection - The Empty Tomb at the base, the Appearance to Thomas at the center, and the Ascension at the top. To be clear, simple medallions that can be read from the floor. To have symbols in the quatrefoils and tracery - perhaps the Lamb of God, and the Chi Rho. Symbols: 1-3 Carpenters tools; 4-6 symbols of the Parables or Miracles; 7-9; Passion symbols; and 10-12 - Resurrection symbols.

Windows a good deal like those in the east transepts - our last windows - but

a little lighter; simpler grisaille fields.
*There is a practically flat roof outside about 6 feet below the windows.

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Note: There is a practically flat roof on the outside of the windows - about six feet below them. There is no provision for storm glazing, and the construction of the sash would make it quite difficult to install storm glass unless it were right up against the leaded glass.

These windows are very appropriately devoted to the Life of Our Lord.

The first panel symbolises His Birth and early Preparation; the second, His Ministry; the third, His Passion; and finally, His triumphant Resurrection.

Three significant incidents are symbolized in each lancet, reading upward.

First, the Nativity with the Blessed Virgin Mary kneeling before the Christ Child in the manger. In the field are Saint Joseph with his flowering staff, the traditional ox and ass, and the Star of Bethlehem casting down its rays on the Holy Child.

The second medallion represents the Boy Jesus in the Temple disputing with the Doctors. - Both hearing them, and asking them questions.

At the top is the Baptism of Our Lord by Saint John the Baptist who holds the symbolic Shell over His head. Above is the descending Dove of the Holy Spirit

In the lower medallion of the second panel Our Lord teaches the Woman of Samaria at Jacob's Well.

Above, He heals the leper who carries the staff and bell to warn others of his presence; and at the top, He is transformed in garments of glistering white accompanied by the Brophets Moses and Elias; with the Apostles Peter, James and John kneeling below.

In the lancet head is the six pointed Creator's Star formed of interlaced triangles.

Symbols at the base represent Saint Joseph's carpenter tools,- the mallet and saw; and the Wheat and Tares of Our Lord's Parable (St. Matthew 13:24).

The dominant quatrefoil of the tracery is enriched with the symbol of the Lamb of God bearing the cruciform banner of victory, with the secred monograms,—

INC and XPC, and Stars of Heavenly steadfastness in smaller members.

The second window begins with the Last Supper. Our Lord holds the cup, before the table surrounded by the twelve Apostles.

Above, He is brought before Pilaty stending bound and holding the reed, while flist washes his hands.

At the top is the Grueifixion, with Mary His Nother and Saint John the beloved disciple at either side. Above is the superscription, --

In the lower medellion of the last panel is the empty tomb with Saints Peter and John, first of the Disciples to reach the tomb, and Saint Hary Magdalam, first to see Him after His Mesurrection.

Above, the risen Christ appears to the doubting Thomas; while at the top is the Ascension, with the welcoming hands of God the Father.

In the base panels are symbols of the Passion, - the Grown of Thorns and Gross, balanced by the traditional Phoenix rising enew from the flames of its nest.

In the tracery quatrefoil is the Gate of Heaven and the Alpha and Omega, the beginning and the end. Other tracery members are enriched with six winged Seraphim, Angelia members nearest the throne of God.

The fields separating and uniting the medallions are designed in geometric and foliated pattern with the resourcing symbol of the Gross.

At the base is the memorial texts,- "In memory of William Connor and Ann Jane Connor", and "In Memory of Howard Ceetl Connor".

The palette is kept light and brilliant though colorful, to adequately illuminate the chair and chancel. Blue is the predominant note throughout, foiled with passages of ruby and green, and clearly accented with gold and silver.
