 "Baptism"
 "Cana. Water into Wine"

Special request
Keep the blues in the window light

They are for the windows at either side of the present Parables. One is devoted to the Miracles, with the first, - the Marriage Feast at Cana as the central theme. Our Lord turns the water to wine, symbolized by red, as the attendant fills other water pots. Above is His mother, and the bride and bridegroom at table.

The Raising of Jairus' Daughter is represented below, with her parents in the background.

In the heads of the lancets is the Cross Potent, also known as the Jerusalem Cross, formed of four Tau crosses resembling ancient crutches meeting at the center. It is the traditional symbol of the Saviour's power to heal the diseases of man's bodies and souls.

The window at the other side is devoted to Baptism, with Our Lord baptized by Saint John the Baptist in the lower medallions, and Christ Blessing little Children (the spiritual baptism) above. Our Lord holds one small child in His arms while a mother brings others to him.

Below, Saint John the Baptist carries the rustic crossed staff and banner and holds the shell of baptism, while cherubim enrich the field at either side of Our Lord standing in the descending rays of Divine blessing.

Again, the shell of baptism is designed in the lancet heads.
