Below, an Angel of praise with trumpet.

Significant symbols are introduced between these and  
at the base, - the Heavenly Crown and the traditional monogram of  
the Blessed Virgin.

The growing vine forms enriching the fields and  
outlining the medallions flower in the fleur-de-lys of Purity.

It is our thought to alternate the arrangement of  
the dominant colors, - ruby and blue through the series. Blue would  
take the position of red and vice versa in the neighboring windows.  
This alternation throughout would add interesting variety without  
disturbing the over-all color balance.

This window is planned to harmonize beautifully with  
their chancel window and also the rose.

"What we need is careful measurements of the rectangular openings, including the ventilator, and a paper pattern of the curved shapes at the top, indicating both the sight or daylight size and the full glass size."
