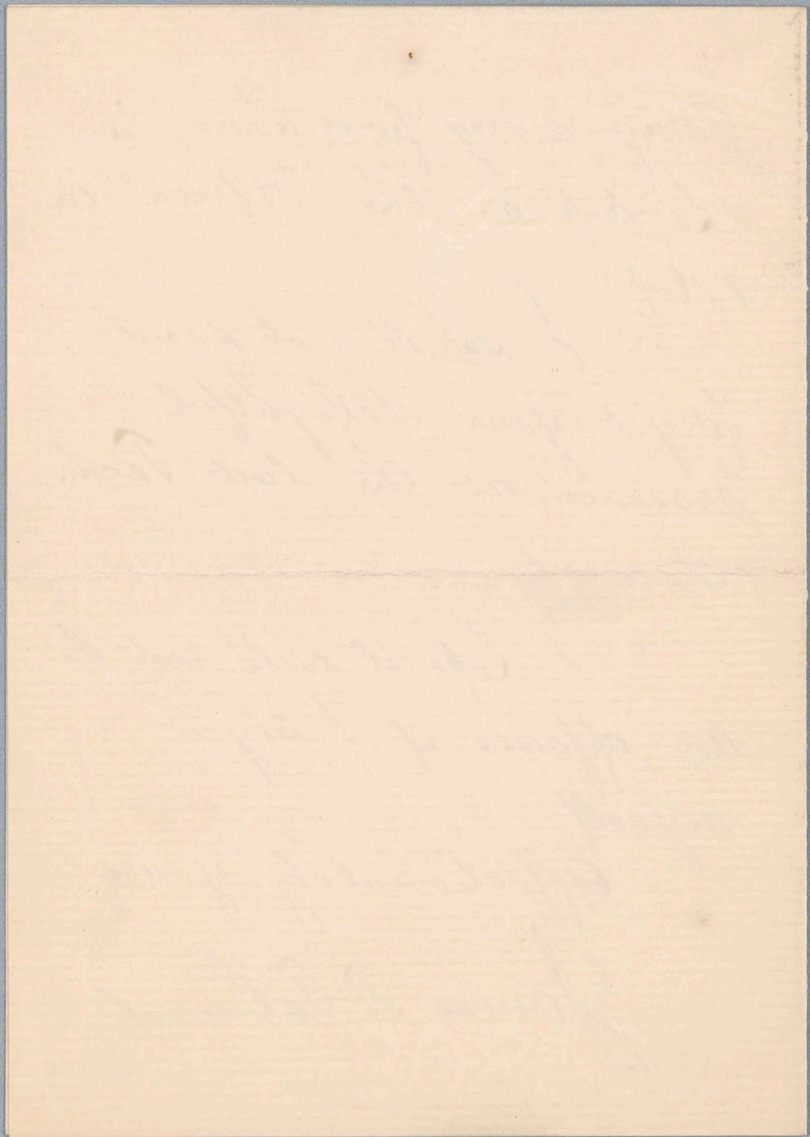
I always associate you in my mind with the Institute, with Professor Rogers, and with my first

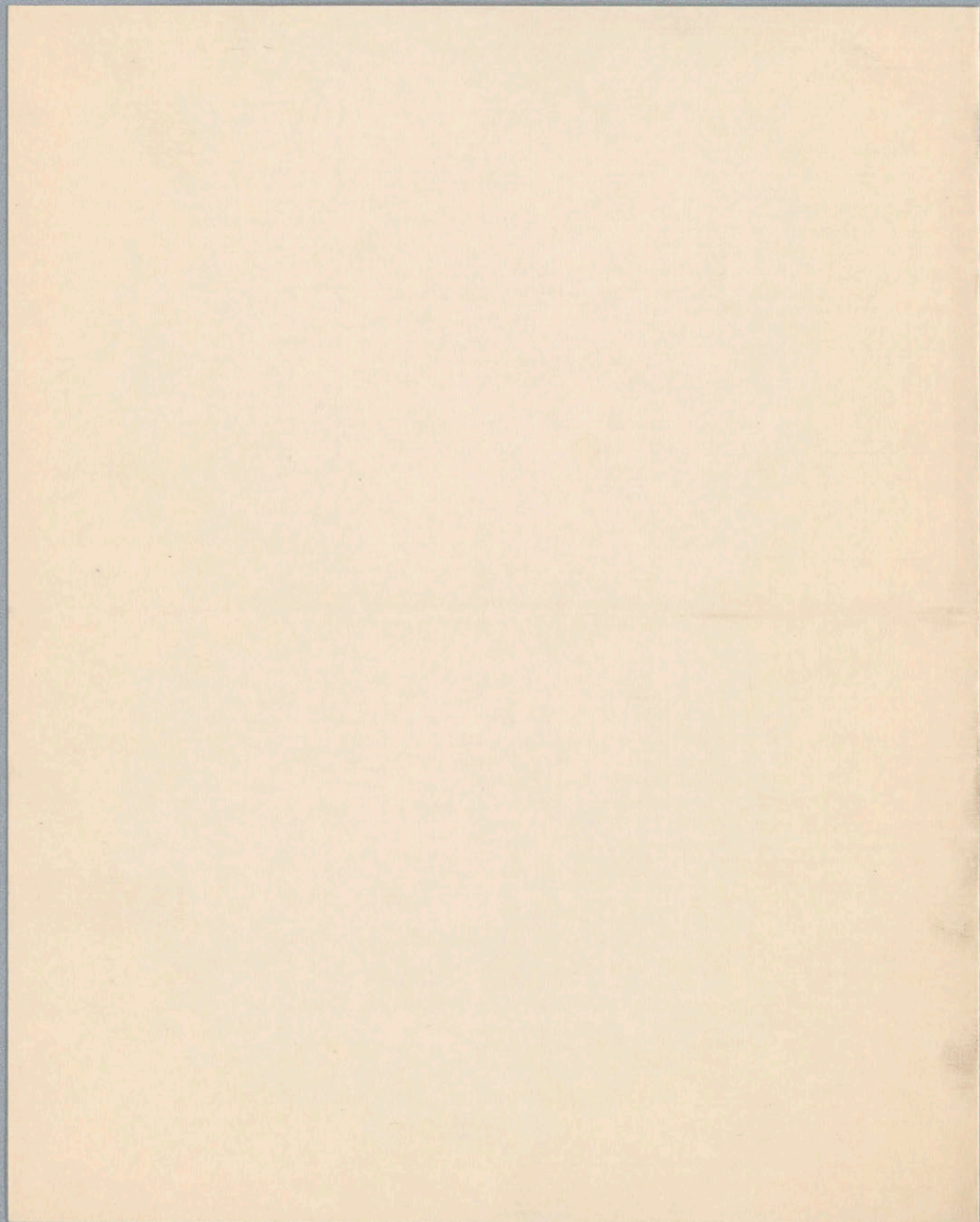

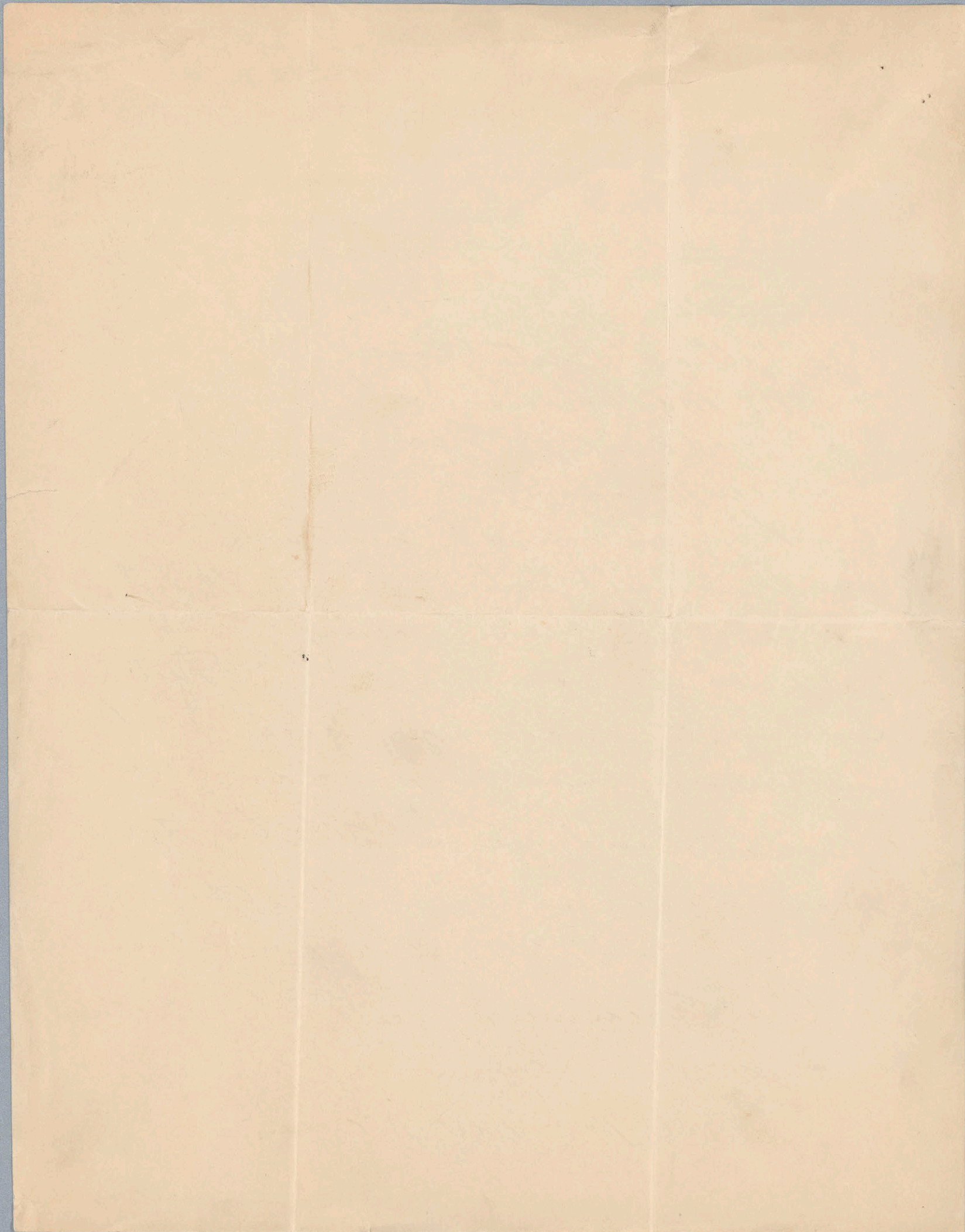

days is very interesting.

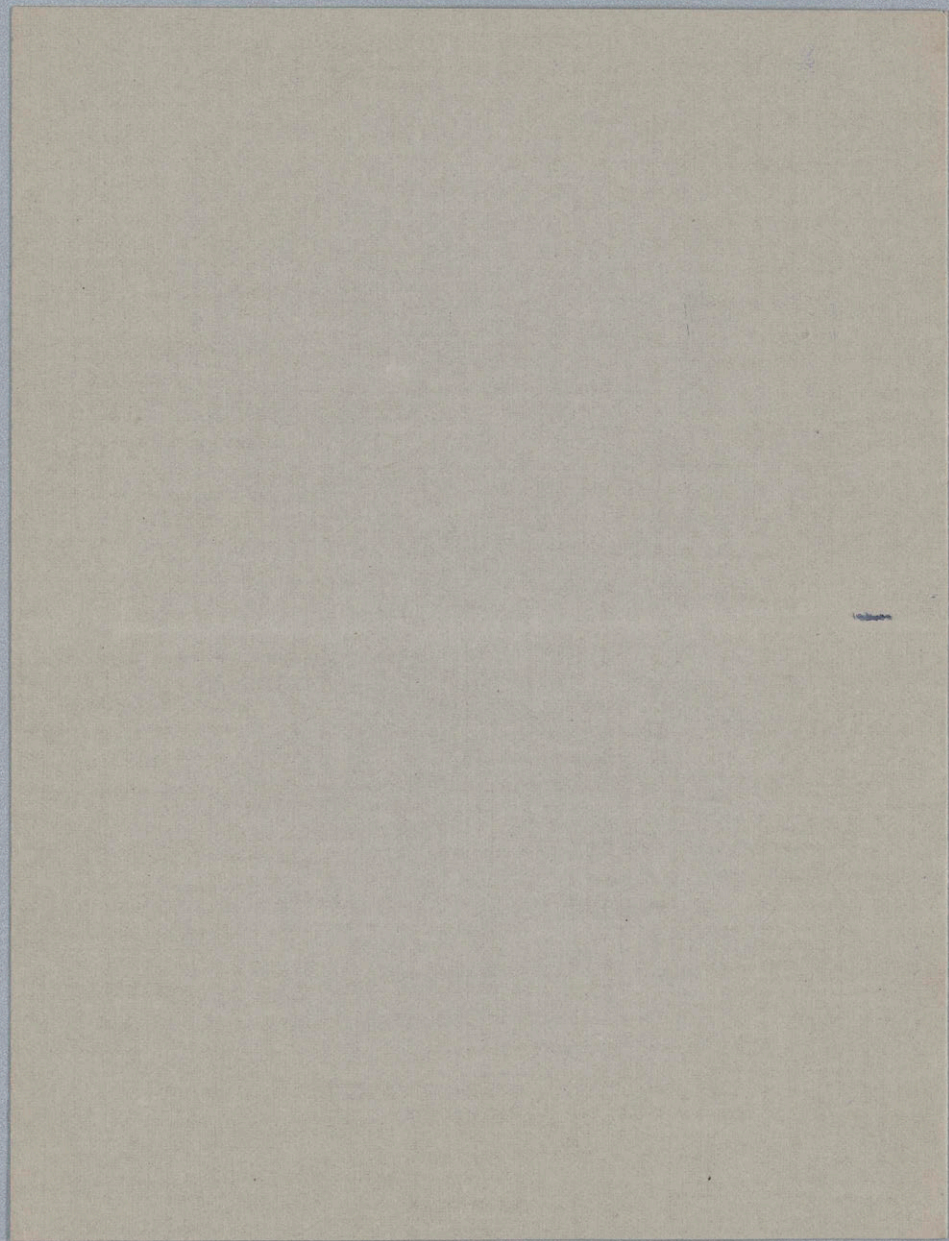
You may be sure that
