Immediately adjoinine, is an optical Loborotory 20 h 24ft which has been fittel with tobles on the use of the microscope spectroscope and other oftical instrumeles. This will accumodate 12 students at me time and prives admirably fitted another adjoining room also 20 by 24 pt is designed In the colorser works. and is to be fitteel with furnaces and steam keette, and other appliances for experiments relating to medistrial Chemistry.
