The School of Bousekeeping

Course for Young Women.

THE SCHOOL OF HOUSEKEEPING stands for a recognition of the fact that Housekeeping is a Profession demanding scientific training. The course offered to young women consists in the application of known principles and facts, scientific and economic, to the maintenance of a healthful, well-ordered home. It includes a study of the management of the household and expenditure of the income according to business methods.

#### Outline of Course.

This course is designed to meet the needs of young college women and others who wish to fit themselves to manage a household on the best economic and hygienic basis. It should be of special value to the young woman who chooses as her profession in life the making of a home, and to the worker in College or Social Settlements. It will be greatly to the advantage of the pupil to reside in the School during the course, for she will thus be furnished unusual facilities for practice, observation and experiment.

To obtain full benefit from the following courses a knowledge of general Chemistry is required. For pupils entering without previous preparation in chemistry, a course of twelve lessons has been arranged, at an extra charge.

## Program of Classes.

House Sanitation: — Lectures, Laboratory Work, and Recitations. Tuesdays and Thursdays, 10-11 Mondays, 3-4. Miss Elliott. Chemistry of Foods: — Lectures, Laboratory Work and Recitations. Mondays and Wednesdays, 9-10. Fridays, 9-11. Mrs. RICHARDS and Miss HYAMS.

Home Economics: — Lectures and Recitations. Tuesdays, 9-10. Miss Dewson.

Home Sociology: — A Study of the Home in its Sociological Aspects. 3 Lectures. Thursdays, 11.30–12.30. Prof. Cummings.

House Architecture: — A Study of the Architect's Relation to the Home. 3 Lectures. Thursdays, 11.30–12.30. Miss Fifield.

Elementary Chemistry:—Lectures and Recitations. Tuesdays, 12-1. Thursdays, 2-3. For six weeks. Miss MacLeod.

Principles of Cooking:— Practice Lessons.

Mondays and Wednesdays, 10-1. Fridays, 11-1.

Miss Huntington.

Principles of Housework: — Practice Lessons. Tuesdays, 11-12. Miss Ellis.

Marketing: — 10 Lessons. Lectures, Field and Practice Lessons. Tuesdays, 2-5. Miss Sherwin. Household Buying: — 5 Lessons. Lectures and Field Lessons. Mondays, 2-3. Miss Elliott.

Estimates of Household Expenditure:— Thursdays, 9-10. Miss Sherwin.

Sewing: — 8 Lessons. Saturdays, 12-1. Miss Huntington.

Resident-pupils will be required to do practicework in Cooking and the various branches of Housework on Thursday afternoons and Saturday mornings.

Special Lectures on subjects related to this course will be given on Thursday mornings 11.30-12.30. Dates and subjects to be announced.

### Terms.

Terms for single classes vary, and can be had on application.

Seven rooms in the School are available for resident-pupils. The price of board is \$72.00 a Quarter. Rooms range in price from \$24.00 to \$50.00 a Quarter. (See plan of rooms enclosed.)

N addition to the resident-pupils a limited number of day-pupils will be received.

All bills are payable in advance. Price of board only, remitted in case of absence on account of illness.

The School also offers a course of training for wage-earners who intend to adopt housework as a trade.

The School is open to visitors every afternoon between the hours of 2 and 4.
