BETTER THINGS FOR BETTER LIVING . . .

A touring reporter commented that the track will be bigger than the Boston Garden's. And with a wide grin, Dick Balch (Director of Athletics) agreed with him. Occasion for the interchange was the opening of the David Flett du Pont Athletic Center.

Rising next the Armory, the sleek new structure to house Institute athletic facilities was the gift of young David du Pont, who was killed four years ago in an automobile accident, just before the start of his senior year. A \$1,000,000 bequest from him gave MIT this center "for the improvement of athletic facilities" -- now, according to Dick Balch, "comparable to those of any similar university in the country."

The building, dedicated on October 5, was officially presented to the Institute by Mrs. Lammot du Pont, who toured it with Drs. Killian and Stratton. Filled with equipment and rooms for the 19 varsity sports at MIT, it contains a spectacular gymnasium, 172 ft. long and 48 ft. wide -- a convertible model which can be divided by two folding, wooden doors; then used for three things at once: wrestling, fencing and individual exercise.

For squash enthusiasts there are six new courts with visitors' galleries. Athletics, intramural sports, coaches, MIT A.A. and student managers all have offices on the sunny, Kresge side of the building; coaches have a special conference and locker room.

The two-story Center is connected to Briggs Field House, the Armory and Rockwell Cage; faces Kresge Auditorium with a gleaming array of glass panels and windows, and can be entered from a terrace area, just now bedecked with ivy, juniper bushes and a wall of hard-toget, flat-faced fieldstone.

Also viewing things from outside in fine arboreal fashion is a flourishing Katsura tree (Cercidiphyllum Japonicum). This came to MIT from a nursery in Lincoln and was lowered away by a special derrick. To complete things artistically, three granite boulders were plunked down beside --specially chosen for quality, color, texture and shape.

Not long after she came, the AEC asked for an inventory of the crib contents and custodian Morris spent some frantic hours totting up the tools, filling a sheaf of typed pages. "It turned out they only wanted to know what we had in general," she remembers ruefully.

When she doesn't have to grab the stepladder for top-shelf orders, she takes over on another job -- "treating" minor crises from headaches to bruises. "Some days I do more business in Bandaids and aspirins than anything else," says she with a smile.
