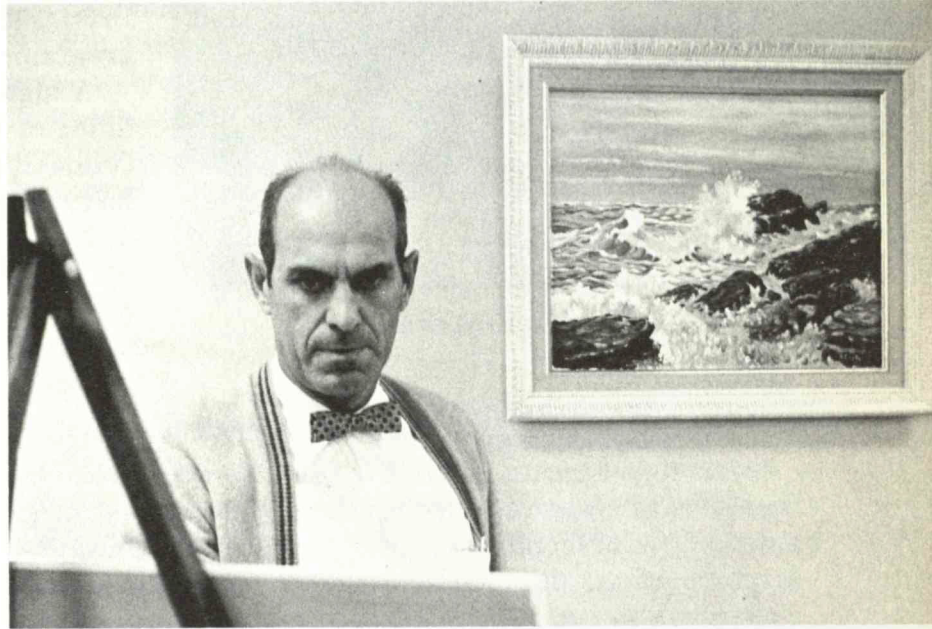

## UF GIVING STARTS

M. I. T. 's 1961 United Fund campaign got off to a strong start during its first week, according to the drive chairman, Dean Robert Holden. Initial totals showed \$13,977.03 was received toward the hoped-for goal of \$65,000. Dean Holden was particularly encouraged by the early showing, since the first total taken was exclusive of reporting from Lincoln Laboratory or from Instrumentation Laboratory.

More than 200 volunteer workers are conducting the UF appeal at M. I. T. this year. Pledge cards and campaign literature went out to departmental and office solicitors during the week of Oct. 12-18. The campaign will run through Nov. 24. Overall goal for the Greater Boston United Fund this year is \$14 million--money urgently needed to support and maintain more than 229 community service agencies in the Greater Boston Area.

## THE MAGNET MASTERS

The plaque was presented to Dr. James R. Killian, Chairman of the M. I. T. Corporation, by Dr. Knox Millsaps, executive officer of AFOSR and a former member of the Mechanical Engineering faculty.

### LINCOLN'S DECENNIAL

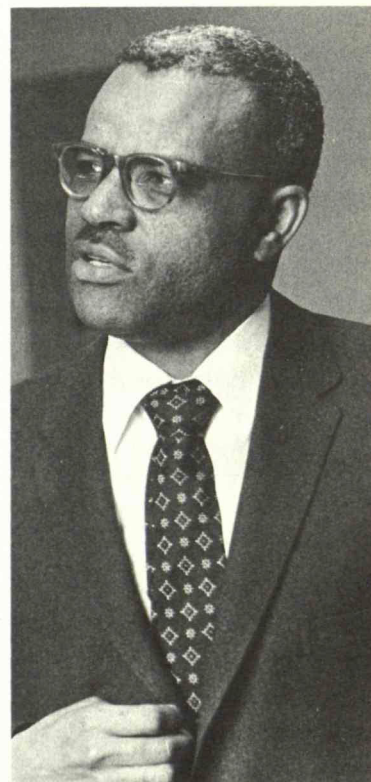
M. I. T.'s Lincoln Laboratory at Lexington, renowned for research in electronics for defense, is 10 years old. To mark this milestone, the Lab this winter is sponsoring eight distinguished public lectures at Kresge Auditorium, Cambridge, aimed at taking a broad look at the larger contexts in which scientists and engineers live and work. First in the Lincoln Decennial Series will be Dr. Hendrik B.G. Casimir, head of the Phillips Research Laboratory, Eindhoven, The Netherlands, who will speak at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Nov. 15, on "Maxwell, Hertz and Lorentz," physicists of a century ago whose work set the stage for much of modern science.

### SPOTLIGHT ON AFRICA

Ezekial Mphahlele, noted South African author and commentator on political and cultural problems of emerging Africa, is spending a few weeks at M. I. T. as a visiting lecturer on African affairs. Mr. Mphahlele, presently the director of the African program of the Congress of Cultural Freedom with headquarters in Paris, France, is widely known for his book, Down Second Avenue, an autobiography detailing his early life in the segregated society of Pretoria, South Africa. His latest book, The African Image, will be published soon.

Mr. Mphahlele's presence at M. I. T. was made possible under a grant from Dr. and Mrs. Arthur W. Sloan of Washington, D. C. The overall Sloan grant (\$500,000) will be used to establish the Arthur and Ruth Sloan professorship in the M. I. T. Political Science Section. Purpose of the professorship will be to emphasize African affairs. Pending appointment of a professor to the chair, the grant is helping bring leading lecturers on Africa to the campus and Mr. Mphahlele is the first.

Mr. Mphahlele lectures this afternoon (Tuesday, Nov. 7) from 1 to 3 p.m. in the Library Lounge at Hayden on "The African Image in Emergent Africa." He will give his final lecture in the lounge at 1 p.m. Nov. 16. The lectures are open to the public.

## DR. WIENER MENDING

Dr. Wiener, the father of cybernetics and a pioneer in information theory, originally was hospitalized at Massachusetts General, but was moved to the Institute Infirmary last week, putting him nearer to friends, colleagues and good bridge players.

## PRESS ON THE MOVE

The M. I. T. Press, the Institute's full-time book publishing house, has moved to new quarters and has expanded its staff in keeping with a stepped up publishing program. Offices of the Press, formerly located in the Hayden Memorial Library, have been moved to Room 20B-120 near the Vassar Street entrance to Bldg. 20.

New staff members include Mrs. Joan Steck, promotion manager, and Gregor Hileman, sales manager. Mrs. Steck, a graduate of Lawrence College, Appleton, Wis., formerly was an advertising copywriter in a Boston ad agency. Her husband, Ted, is in Harvard Medical School. The Press, under its director, Professor Lynwood Bryant, presently is in the process of distributing its fall catalog which carries titles reflecting a broad spectrum of subjects. Recent and forthcoming works deal in social science, city planning, communications, computer theory, history and industrial management, to name a few. Nov. 3 was the publishing date of Industrial Dynamics by Professor Jay W. Forrester of Industrial Management. Soon to follow will be Structure and Strategy, a study of decentralization of American industry written by Professor Alfred D. Chandler, Jr., of Humanities. Also on the schedule is Management and the Computer of the Future, a collection of eight lectures and discussions held at M. I. T. last spring and edited by Professor Greenberger of Industrial Management.
