



A NEW COMMENCEMENT

The third issue of Tech Talk--back in March 1957--featured a profile of Dr. Julius Adams Stratton as Chancellor of the Institute. It was the first of some sixty times he has appeared in these pages. Later that year he was appointed Acting President, and in




At Dr. Stratton's inauguration in June 1959, Professor William P. Allis (Physics) pointed out that both Dr. Stratton and MIT arrived here via water--Dr. Stratton as a radio operator aboard a boat from the West Coast, and MIT on a barge from its Boston Tech home across the river. In fact, MIT was still getting settled in Cambridge when young Julius Stratton arrived.

In 1923 Dr. Samuel Wesley Stratton (no relation) became MIT's eighth president and Julius A. Stratton received the S.B. degree in electrical engineering. Members of the Class of '23 wore no beards or moustaches and were likely to part their hair in the middle. They belonged to such organizations as the Mandolin Club or the British Empire Club and told jokes about prohibition, Rudolph Valentino and Boston traffic problems. Electrical Engineering was--and still is--the most popular course; one promising young member of its faculty was Dr. Vannevar Bush.

The MIT of 1923 was a raw young thing. Buildings 7 and 6 were yet to be built and the few trees in the Great Court were saplings. Besides the main complex the campus consisted of Walker Memorial and Senior House. Though Ashdown House existed, it was still the Riverview Court Hotel. The annual budget for 1923 was slightly over \$2 million. Ninety per cent of the 3,100 students were undergraduates, some coming from such places as Abyssinia and Serbia.





Prof. Allis recalled, "You and I rode dugout canoes down a jungle river where the woods were full of stinging ants, and bees, and gorgeous butterflies."


In 1959 McGeorge Bundy was dean at Harvard when Dr. Stratton received an honorary LL.D. as a "humane, perceptive man of science, a good neighbor and helpful friend." McGeorge Bundy, as president of the Ford Foundation, will soon be joined by Dr. Stratton in New York.



Last fall Dr. Stratton said, "Again and again... I came to the point of... shaking off the ties to this campus and going out to explore new lands. But each time some strange, compelling force...drew me back and held me here."

As he stayed on, the MIT we know today began to take shape. Not only did Buildings 6 and 7 rise, but structures were acquired or built to fill the numbering system well into the 50's. Shrubbery and trees have grown to soften the austere facade. The academic budget for the last fiscal year was more than \$35 million. The student body has doubled and graduate students make up nearly half of it. Abyssinia and Serbia, now countries of the past, have been replaced by Malaysia and Ghana.


After graduating, Dr. Stratton studied for a year in Europe, then returned to the Institute where he received the S.M. in 1925. He was a research associate in communications for two years during which his interest in the scientific principles behind electrical engineering increased. In 1926 he again went abroad to study at the Eidgenossische Technische Hochschule in Zurich. His thesis, written in good German, was completed in 1927, and he was awarded the Doctor of Science degree in mathematical physics.

Dr. Stratton stayed on in Europe the following year on a traveling fellowship from MIT, studying at the Universities of Munich and Leipzig. In 1928 he returned to the Institute to become assistant professor of Electrical Engineering where he taught theory of electricity and magnetism and wrote "Electromagnetic Theory," which became the most widely read book in the field.

There was time for relaxation in those years, too. Together with Prof. Allis, he made a trip down the Yukon in a rowboat and another by donkey and canoe in Ecuador where they made friends with some head-hunting Indians. A still later trip took them overland from Geneva to Istanbul, this time with their brides.



At a retirement dinner, the faculty gave Dr. Stratton a Questar telescope, which, Prof. Allis said, "You can also use for birdwatching in Vermont or for girl-watching in New York."

Dr. Stratton joined the Department of Physics in 1931 and became a full professor ten years later. When the Radiation Laboratory was formed to develop radar during the war, Dr. Stratton was one of the first members of its staff. A request from the Secretary of War took him to Washington in 1942, where he remained as an expert consultant for the duration of the war. His work there was rewarded by presentation of the Medal for Merit from the Secretary of War.

Once more Dr. Stratton returned to MIT. In 1946 the Research Laboratory of Electronics was formed to continue the basic research begun by the

Radiation Laboratory. It was the first of the large interdisciplinary laboratories which have become so important to the Institute's progress, and Dr. Stratton was its first director.

Since then Dr. Stratton has been increasingly involved with administrative matters, as vice president, provost, chancellor, acting president and finally, president. His main concern in all of these positions has been MIT's role as an educational institution. In his inaugural address he said, "Everything we do, whether for the advancement of knowledge or in the interest of public service should be viewed in the larger context of our teaching mission."

Dr. Stratton can review with satisfaction the accomplishments of his administration. Not only have buildings grown, but also the educational program. A new curriculum, embarked upon by last year's freshmen, encourages intellectual initiative. Four new departments have evolved in the School of Humanities and Social Science to broaden the influence of science and engineering on human affairs. Student activities in the community at large attest to an awareness of the need for contributing to the public good. The arts have burgeoned to the extent that they now suffer limitations of time and space.

But Dr. Stratton has always thought of the Institute as people. Appropriately, it will especially be as a person that the Institute

pecially be as a person that the Institute will miss him. Receptions and parties have had a large part of the Stratton calendar, as various groups have extended warm wishes for a happy retirement. His retirement does not mean a complete withdrawal from MIT. Though he will be busy in New York as Chairman of the Board of the Ford Foundation, he will have an office at the Institute and be back here regularly.

Dr. James R. Killian, Jr., quoted from "Pilgrim's Progress" at the inauguration, "My sword I give to him that shall succeed me... My marks and scars I carry with me." We hope the marks and scars Dr. Stratton has acquired are few.
