### LANGUAGE LAB--CASUAL STYLE

Arriving at MIT is a scarifying event for a couple of hundred wives each year. They are the foreign wives who suddenly find themselves in complicated Cambridge without one terribly important tool--English.

The MIT Matrons and Dames come to the rescue with an imaginative program of conversational English to take the edge off the strangeness. Each Tuesday and Thursday morning the fourth floor of the Stratton Center resounds with exotic tongues as 20 to 30 foreign wives come to learn such things as how to get along in the supermarket, or around town on the Big T. For the supermarket lesson, the wives brought empty boxes and cans to set up a "pretend" store where they could practice making selections, figuring prices and making change.

Just around the corner from the English class is a noisy multi-lingual nursery where the wives' children cavort with crayons and cutouts--universals that need no English.

### MIDDAY MUSICALES

The popular Thursday noon hour concerts in the MIT Chapel are beginning again today (October 19). Formerly only organ recitals by student organists and visitors, the concerts have been broadened recently to include singers and instrumentalists in addition to those performing on the harpsichord and organ. Opening this year's

series is soprano Dorothy Traub of the Music Library, accompanied on the harpsichord by Institute Organist John Cook, in a program of works by Handel, Mozart, Peri and Luzzaschi. Next week it will be renaissance music with Joel Cohen, flute, and John Cook at the harpsichord.

## THERE'S A FORD IN OUR PRESENCE

Away back in 1914 a young man, who was building a promising career with the Old Colony Trust Company, took a chance on MIT's future and became the Institute's Bursar. He was Horace Sayford Ford, one of the Institute's most beloved friends for the next forty years or so, as bursar, treasurer and Life Member of the Corporation.

At the Corporation meeting earlier this month, Mr. Ford's dedication to the Institute and its community was honored by naming the Administrative Services (Daggett) Building for him. Mr. Ford is now nearly 83 and seldom comes to MIT anymore, but the presence of his namesake is a fond remembrance for many of us who knew him well.

The Ford Building is the second largest building on campus--only the original complex is larger--and houses offices and laboratories in which nearly 750 of us work. The remaining portion of the building, now leased to commercial concerns, will be redeveloped for Institute use within the next few years.



# THE PLEASURE OF HIS COMPANY

With little advance notice and no fanfare, the Institute last Monday entertained a very distinguished visitor, His Excellency, Anatole Dobrynin, Soviet Ambassador to the U.S. Ambassador Dobrynin spent a quiet Sunday in Boston doing a little sightseeing, like any tourist, though his official mission here was to open a comprehensive exhibit on Russian education at Boston College. The exhibit, a display of more than 2,100 educational tools, was arranged under the cultural exchange program and will tour the United States after closing at B.C. on November 13.

At MIT, the Ambassador chatted informally with a number of Institute officials including an old friend from Washington, MIT Provost Jerome B. Wiesner. Then he made a quick tour of the Institute which included a brief look at Project MAC and at the Apollo mock-up at Instrumentation, before being whisked off in a limousine for more talk over a luncheon at Harvard.

## HAACKE HAPPENING

Many of us visited and enjoyed the kinetic sculpture exhibit in Hayden Gallery last spring. Who can forget the balloon bouncing on the shaft of air, or the billowing chiffon hung from the center of the ceiling? Now we're going to have another chance. Hans Haacke, whose works those were, along with two others, has a one-man exhibit opening here next week. But this show is not restricted to the gallery--it undulates its way through the Institute to the Kresge Plaza.

In short, it's a happening. Putting together works from such improbable materials as water, fabric, grass, soil and balloons, Haacke's aim is to "make something which the spectator handles, with which he plays and thus animates."

The show opens festively next Tuesday (October 24) when Haacke will launch a column of helium-filled balloons on the plaza, beginning at ll a.m. and continuing until evening. Then comes the official opening in the gallery from 7 to 9, to which everyone is invited. Included in the exhibit are more than a dozen moving objects, several of which were designed especially for our gallery.

In case you miss the opening, the show will continue through November 26. And there's one part of it that you probably can't miss--a 40-foot weather balloon dancing on air currents in the Rogers Building rotunda.
