COMMENCEMENT

The happiness and joy of fulfillment which usually accompany graduation time were subdued this year. Shock and horror at the murder of Senator Robert F. Kennedy gave a different dimension to the concerns facing the Class of 1968. But, if the seniors themselves look ahead doubtfully, their elders were more optimistic for their future.

Dr. Clark Kerr, former president of the University of California, delivered the baccalaureate address to seniors and their families on Thursday afternoon. He spoke of legacies these students take with them: "a new interest in academic reform; a new type of student leadership less concerned with athletics and activities and more concerned with reform on the campus and in the community; and the legacy of greatly expanded service activities for members of the surrounding community." Dr. Kerr's speech was preceded by a brief eulogy to Senator Kennedy by our provost, Dr. Jerome B. Wiesner, former science advisor to President Kennedy and a friend of the family.

The gift of the Class of '68 is symbolic of its concern for our common environment. Their lasting mark is a new lounge on the second floor balcony of the Rogers Building. Carpeting, comfortable chairs and bright works of art have transformed a corridor into a pleasant area for relaxation.

At Commencement Exercises last Friday morning, President Johnson presented diplomas to 1,131 seniors and graduate students. In his address, Mr. Johnson commended the students for seeking individualism. "I hear students speak, above all, for the freedom of individualism," he said. "It is the pointed purpose of youth today to defy the precise description that might run the risk of equating one's own style with that of someone else. This is to me a message that speaks of a seeking for personal uniqueness—a uniqueness that assumes a wide diversity of points of view..." And at the close, he charged, "Even in days of deepening sadness, it must be said that your times will be what you make of them. The leadership you provide, your sense of commitment to the purposes of humanity, your standards, can make the vital difference."

FUND FOUNDING

Within the next few days we will all receive letters describing the establishment of the MIT Community Service Fund. For many years it has been Institute policy that the only authorized solicitation on campus each year is the United Fund, but our own interest

and action in many areas of community service have brought about reconsideration of this policy.

Tech Talk has frequently reported on community-oriented programs during the past few years. While many of the first social service projects -- such things as tutoring, group work and mental hospital service -- were begun by students with faculty advice, increasing numbers of volunteers have come from the ranks of secretaries and technicians. It all amounts to a widening, yet personal, awareness of the multitude of needs which are not being met in the community around us. During the past year more than a thousand of us have contributed time and talent to these programs.

It costs a minimum of \$150 per year to put a volunteer on the road, so to speak. Expenses are incurred in matching the volunteer to the job or person, providing materials he may need to be effective, and transportation costs he sometimes cannot assume himself. There is an immediate need for \$20,000 to sustain programs already underway and, of course, further funding in order to expand and undertake new projects.

Because of the urgent need for social service programs to continue and because of the pleasure and fulfillment so many MITers have found in their various activities in the larger community, the MIT Community Service Fund has been formed. The fund will be administered by a board of trustees composed of students, employees, staff and faculty. Authorization has been granted to the board to solicit support from the MIT community for Institute-associated service projects.

The letter you will receive soon will describe how contributions to the Community Service Fund may be made. Arrangements have been made with the Payroll Office for regular payroll deductions during the year and, of course, contributions may be made in one lump sum, either by payroll deduction or by cash.

Please consider making a generous contribution to this new fund and also think over ways you might be able to participate actively in this person to person program.

SPINNING YOUR WHEELS?

Do you spend your days in a wheelchair, or know someone who does? Now's the time to

tip him--or her--off about the first Bay State Wheelchair Games which will be held here at MIT the last weekend in June. Sponsored by the Massachusetts Association of Paraplegics, Inc., (MAP), the games are expected to draw at least 100 wheelchair athletes, but each additional competitor will be warmly welcomed. SUMMER VACATION

We all love them, but one important member of the community is taking the whole summer off for an extended beauty treatment. For the next couple of months, Kresge Auditorium will be off limits to all visitors -- in fact, the doors will be locked.

When it reopens at the beginning of September, the auditorium will look much the same as it does now, but it will operate much more smoothly. Among the more obvious improvements will be additional house lighting in the main auditorium. Unseen by audiences, but appreliated by production managers, ways of managing both house and stage lights will become more flexible.

To make the acoustical properties better, the front and sides

of the projection booth will be carpeted to match the walls. The general sound system, partly transistorized now, will be completely converted to transis tors. Nor is the "king of instruments," the organ, to be ignored. Each of its more than 2,000 pipes -- except the 8-footers -- will be carefully removed, cleaned, and replaced.

In a continuation of the program to remove architectural barriers to people in wheelchairs, the north side entrance to the main auditorium will be ramped, and some seats in the house will be made removable to provide wheel- restaurant near Fort Washington. chair stations. A restroom for handicapped persons is already in operation on the lower level of the auditorium.


