The firat thing I remember vas that on the right hand side on the corner there was a modern building againgt on oldrefinionod building whioh looked rather nice. The contrast wasn't jarring or anything. And I noticed a big glag frer the pavenent, and I remarked on that. I'm not sure whather it was Brooks Bros. .- oh, but that was later.

And there was a left turn, and we turned onto a street which wasn't vary pretty by any means. On the right hand side of the street the hati heights of the buigaings were very diverous, and that was a $21 . t t l a ~ j a r r i n g$. There was a psoudo-organ grinder on the left, or was it a trumpet or somothing? The loft hand side of the street was pretty busy. The right hand side was more or lass residential and office buildifge. The left side was shops.

Then we cane out near the Gardans, and the Gardens were rather bare because there was. $/ f$ no snow. They wore laid out pretty well. There were batches 8 f grass and lots of paved ways which I thought at the time was muoh better than the great bag sweop of the Comnon beyond it. We went into the Gardens, and then we aurk walked parallel to them on the road.

And then we aame to a very good street, I think the best street that we passed. The right hand side had a couple of ohurches, or maybe a church and 12 brary or sonething, but sort of similar architecture. On the loft hand side were sutdued fashion shops. I think that was the best part of the walk.
Oh, I should go back to the first streot, or was it second? On the, fight hand side I noticed sonething jarring, and that was a very naw shop called ndias. Beli Ind it there vasthis - samehow whioh ronindod me of a palace on a river thet I bad seen someplace. $\}$ There was this great big atraight balcony sort of thing in back, black I think it was.
I was a ifttle impressed by the position of Bonwit Beller's bocause it had nothing near it. It took up a sort of aquare all by itsff. Sanahow I had the feeling it siould be built up more, up into the sky. Porhaps that's beqause, seelng places like liom York, one assoclates a square like that all by 1 tself with something rialng up -- I'm not quite sure.
Then there was that alloy which was rather unusual becauso the rubbiah in the allay vas not the facrimgancas common or gardon typo of rubbish, it was rather industrial or packing house rubbish with lots of arathF, not many paeled onions or that sort of thing, nothing stinking very imth. For an alley it was tolerably olpan. Nalking through the alley, on the left there was this incongruous bit of brick work whioh had stopped same time back, and I was wondering why. Probably the contractor went out of business or the ovine changed his mind. Anyway, it rather stuok out somewhat. Of course, there were the fire eacapos which didn'今 look particulerly pretty.
(ihat thing or event made the greatost Impression?) Nembury St., because of the architeoture, fack on the right, the old kind of architggture, and tho subdued shops on the left. (Any particular buildings?) Bonvit Te 118 r , and limcas coning out of that black balcony behind 1t. Brooks Bros, mfiely because of the flag. The half finiahod Srick-work; that really ian'ta building, but maybe a hemmed-in courtyard or sociething. There was one churoh, I think, or one builaing on that Nowbury St. right hand side whioh stood out from the rest of them, oven though they were protty similar arohitooturelly. As far as impreasions go, not a fory favorable impression, was the right hand side of our first left in which the hoights of tho buildings didn't go at all. (You don't know which building on Nowbury St. you wero talking about?) No. It was higher than the rest. I think it might be a churoh, I'm not sure.
(Any perticular features about these buildingsa) Yes. I'm repeating myself, but Kakas coning out from that balcony sort of thing, whioh wasn't really a feature, rather it is a combination that I remembor. I don't think I renember any features as such. On the
right hand side of Newbury St. It was the arohitecture it general. Of course, I said the planning of the Gardens. Coning into Boylaton St. (Berkeley), on the corner was again this modern building - no, a sem1-old building contrastod against a lapge modorn building. I don't recall what it was right now... (The hotels?) It gave the feeling of not being complate to me. I had associnted arohiteoture like that with perhapa going up a ilttle more; it seened cut off too short.
(Any particular people or types?) Yes. The musician on the road, With his funny hat, aort of tin hat with bells on 1t. The orowd wes pretty average, I think, for a looality like that in Boston. I don't remember any special poople. (Iypes?) Not really, no. I imagine a couple of them were a type that's easily distinguishable, either coming from out of town someplace. But those are distinguishable not from what they are but from tho way thoy 100 k , the way they walk. They didn't soem to be very familiar with whatthey were walking through. Not Bostonians; not necessarily Massachusetts or USA. So (Any particular sounds?) Again the music on the road. The Gardan I remember beceuse there wasn't too much of sound, even though just a couple of blocks avay the traffig was pretty hoavy. (smells? No. I renenbor, however, that the alley was rather free from smolls, which agein made it a little aifferent from most alleys; perheps it was so early in the evening.
(Traffic?) Parsonally, I had to find a paricing place 3 blocks away. That's one thing. The traffio didn't sean to be very, vory hoavy, but it was heavy onough. Again, Boylston St. stood out because of the easo by which traffic was able to travel through it. I remember making the ramark that there should be more streets Like that. But theq, of course, it's difficult if you want to go the other way. Perhaps if thare was a street just ta aljakoant to Boylaton St., zrancing the othor way all the way with Boylston it would be much aasier for traffic. (Any signs you remembor?) Kakas, for one thing, It wasn (very go out it ran beasuse there was a grant big open space and then just these words on $2 t .0$ I ramember some of the, in general not in purtioular, somgipf the signs on the loft hand side of fiewbury, aside from Brooks Bros, whi ah I recall/Vecause of the flag. Bonwit Teller's I recali bocause - I didn't reelly see the sign- I did gee a simp, wann't it in vary small letters? Incidentally, I think that's the way things should be. Signs shouldn't be very, very conspicuous on the road like thnt.
(How many definite areas?) I could make out 3 distinct, dirferent impressions. I don't know if that'a whet you moant by sreas. There mas somi-gandiness of Boylst on St. and
the sounds associated with that. Thore was the relative quiet, pif possibly oven quaintness of the Cardens. Newbury 3t. was very distinotly on a differont level then Boylston. Both of these things contributed to 1t: The old architeoture on the right and the shops on the left contributed to the impression of a higher level. Then there was the alley, of course. (Do you feel thess arees fit together as a whole; are they separate areas by thamselvea?) They stand off from each othor; thoy don't go together. I would say they are separate aroas. (Thare were 4: The Gardens, Boylaton St., Newbury St., and the alloy? That's right. But the alley nocessarily goes with at least 2 of thom. (Continuity in the area as a whole?) That I meant was that with any one of these four impressions, except perhaps the Garden Impression, $-\operatorname{lot}^{\prime} \mathrm{E}$ say, with any one of two impressions, Newbury or Boylston St., the alley must be along with it; it's just nocoasary. So perhaps the alley and eithar Boylston and Nowbury, oven though they are different, go together, so that they might be the same area. (Thorefore 3 areas?) Yes - the slley and Boylston, the alley and Wembury, and the dardans.
(Aaything that eave these areas a character of their oum?) Very much 30. As I said, Newbury - the architecture on the right and the subdued shope on the left; Boylston gaudiness by the shops which were of a difforent galibre than the ones on the left side of Newbury; the Cardens just because thoy are the Gardons. Of cuurse, thoy were a better type of Gardens bocause of the planning of the pavod waye. The alloy was obviously ah alloy but a bettar class.
(Anything that gave then order?) Things seemed to conform. Por instance, the gaudy Boylston $\mathrm{St}_{\mathrm{t}}$, even though the buildings on the right side were of different sizes, the main fact that they were all of different sizes meant that they were a unit. And again the shope on the left of Boylston St. were all seni-gaudy, or even on the right with Eakas. The shops on the left of Newbury were all beyond a certain calibre. There, again,
thare was a confomity, and there again the whole right side of Newbury, except for maybe a couple of not-really-old but semi-modern buildings, there again there was this confor nity. I think this confomity gives them the ordar that you're speaking about. (Two different kinds of confomity -- between Boylston and Newbury?) Yes, two distinotly iffferent types or conformity. Zven in a street like Newbury, by itself, there are two types of conformity - quite simply, the laft-hand side and the rigit-hand aide. Yes, I do feel that thare was a sense of order in these two areas. Perhaps least in the Gerdens. That was mainly due to the skating rink, I think. It didn't somohow go with the - woll, thare was white ice on It, first of all, and people skating on it. That may be a seasonal impression. It didn't quite go with the green Brass and tho pavad ways and the bare trees.
(Anything that gavenh these areas continuity?) As a unit or in thonselves? (Either way) As a whole, I don't think there was any continuity at all. Within thenselves, the continuity that was there was mers conformity, as I have aaid. OR course, this Impression perhaps -- well; there was a definite break betwean the two sides of Newbury, and inasmuch as there was this broak there was a break also in the continuity. There was a completely distinct impression if one was walking along one side and if one was walking along the other side.
(Sidesalk pavement?) No, I couldn't desoriba it. (Street pavement?) Crowded, is all I remember. Beacuse of that I think the pavement doesn't at all come into view, since it was orowded.
(Ouestion 12) Very well. Not because I think Boston is ano type of plece but rather because $\$$ I think Boston has all these separate qualities -- the quality of the Cardens and the quality, very much, of Newbury St., then digain the gaudy quality of Boylston St. (Been there often?) Perhaps driven, but not walked. (Used the aree at ell?) Yes, I have used Newbury. I've never waiked in the Garciens. (Use Nowbury for shopping?) Yes, acke that's about all I'vo used it for.
(Could you find your destination without any trouble, if you oane here for any particular purpose\%) Yes, (Feal at ease in this part of the city?) Very muck so. It's muah more comfortable than some of the other parts.
(Dëseribe foelings you experienced as we walked?) The cistinct Impression was that of contrast. It was at the corner of Berkeley and Boylston. Then there was one of loudness on Boylston and through Boylston, perhaps garishness. There were the Gardens which have a feeling of their owm associated with them; that would be Cerdons in gonoral, I think. I remomber feeling thet even an afternoon's snow alters Boston completely, makes It much, much more nellow. That was one thing - over in the cardens I didn't foel mellow at all. Newbury St. was very nice; no exultant feeling or anything, but perhaps if I were a Bostonian I vould like to walk down Newbury most mathex than stroll in the Cardens or walk along Boylston, or dodgo through allays.
(ihat did you like or dislike?) Nothing. I think, all of these alements belong to them all of them. As I said, looicing beok on it , tecousinas a ramaricablo oross-seotion I think.
(If you could change is in any way, what would you do?) I'd change the right hand a ide of Boylaton arohiteoturelly. A Porhapa I'd malso Boylston a tillice wider. Porhaps abolish loud signs or algns that hit ono ovan ifthey somotimas aron't loud. I'd put snow in the Gardons. Porhaps I'd eloan up the ali oy a littlo and Iiniah that unfinishod little piece. Newbury 3t. I'd loavo axhetly as it 13 , axpopts porhaps put moro paricing metors.
