Saint Chrysostom's Church, Chicago, Illinois.

Three-lancet aisle window, second from the altar on North Side.

Light obscured by cream colored brick wall fifteen feet away.

Subject, Saint Elisabeth (Mother of Saint John Baptist)

One lancet in memory of father, one in memory of the mother, the third of the saint.

The window is being donated by Mrs. A.A. Sprague.

The Father - Henry Dibblee

Born August 20, 1840 - Died December 19, 1907.

Was a successful business man engaged in the Real Estate business in Chicago.

He was fond of books, and had a lovely library; and of horses, travel boats and pictures.

He had a real fondness for Saint Christopher.

The Mother - Laura Field Dibblee

Born October 31, 1849 - Died August 24, 1921.

She was born in Conway, Massachusetts, on a farm. Her brother was Marshall Field, Chicago Merchant, and he built the Library at Conway.

She was a woman of extreme charm and beauty and had a most marvelous sense of colors and the blending of them. Her tastes were in books, travels and the aesthetic values of life.

She was tremendously interested in and engrossed in the life of this Parish - Saint Chrysostom's - was ~~xxx~~ on the Women's Board of Saint Luke's Hospital, and the Board of the Home for Crippled Children. In all three she had splendid work. Mother of two children, and a person of great social tact and thoughtfulness.
