General Information The chancel window is about 8 feet from the floor and should be treated with fine detail and the most brilliant glass obtainable. The present rough plate was evidently set directly into the stone with cement. It would be well to have whoever takes the size study this matter very carefully.

Three upper chancel windows south, and two north that must be stippled with paint. This should be taken up again with Mrs. Stodder, and possibly with minister also. There are four aisle windows, south, and four north, two west either side of the door, and one above the door in the west. All the windows in the nave should be stippled, but this is not so important as the chancel.
