General Information "Jesse Tree Subject", in brilliant grisaille.

\*C.J.C. said June 22, 1928 - "I believe that the present iron work which consists of small tee irons fairly near together throughout the lancets should be retained, and these tee irons should form the substantial rhythm of the whole sketch."

Apr. 13, 1934. "The idea that I am expressing in this design is that faithful followers from the earliest days are a part of the growing form symbolized by the Tree of Jesse. To this end I have added two later Americans symbolic of the life of the Church in America." C.J.C. to Dr. Kirk.

May 15, 1934: "You will note that, first of all, my idea is to have a great symphony in color - active and significant - but serene, with the most beautiful quality of blue that I can imagine.

...I am sure, too, that you will be sympathetic with the idea of the spiritual Jesse Tree that suggests a relationship through the ages, and that worthy Christian workers of all time are definitely within that beautiful relationship."
