General Information See newspaper clipping in folder which tells about Mr. Given's life and activities. Also see notes in folder about other windows in the church.

Representations of Peter and Luke occupy the central openings. (Have asked how they are treated). "It occurs to me that Saint Paul would be an excellent symbol to continue the group, both in his character of organizer and founder and in his relation as companion to Saint Luke. Luke is mentioned by name in only three passages in the Bible, and these are all in the Epistles of Saint Paul. Incidentally, the opposite figure, to complete the group, might well be Saint Mark, the interpreter and constant companion of St. Peter.

See snapshots sent by Rev. Wingert of windows new in the church, and also of the window opening in question. The particular window is 24" wide and 62" high, not counting frame or figure stop. For addresses of those to be notified as window progresses, see other side.

Rev. Wingerd wrote June 1, 1936 - "The color of the robes of the two figures is dark red and the color of the background in which they are placed is dark blue. The columns on either side are red and the arches are light blue with red dots the size of a marble. Back of columns there is lavender and above the arches there is yellow." (These color notes were sent to enable us to visualize the present windows).
