These designs present the five remaining Sacraments, developed in symbolic figures, to complete the scheme of clerestory subjects.

The central lancet for each window has been carried out to indicate the three distinctive grisaille patterns in relation to the figure groups. (These three patterns also follow the order already begun in the six windows now in place. The position and number from the altar is indicated on each design.)

The accompanying design (made for the Annunciation window, now in place) may be used with each of the five center lancet designs to suggest, roughly, the effect of the complete windows.

As in the other Sacrament windows the symbolic figure of Our Lord dominates each design. The liturgical vestments are of mediaeval type, in harmony with the Gothic character of the chapel, and reflect in color venerable traditions of Christian symbolism.

Extreme Unction

The figures of the Saviour and the aged man recall the healing of the impotent man at the Pool of Bethesda. Purple, the color of sorrow and humility, distinguishes the cope and stole, over the white, of faith, in the surplice. The oil of the sick is held by the figure of an angel above as server.
