The clerestory windows have been designed to let in sufficient light while avoiding any glare.

The color schemes are arranged to alternate, as shown in these two sketches. Each window is to contain a definite symbol of Apostle and famous early Christian characters. For example, Saint James and Saint Andrew are presented in these two designs as a part of the scheme which is to complete the Apostles and the Four Evangelists, unless otherwise ordered.
