General Information Mrs. Pigott was a very rare combination of social leader and church leader - a very spiritual woman, but with a keen sense of humor. Window is to be made somewhat like the design we made for Margie Deems; with Christ the Light of the World about equal in size to the figure of the Archangel Raphael in the former design.
In the upper inscription, the words large enough to be read at a reasonable distance: "I am the Light of the World." SEE INSCRIPTION ON OTHER SIDE.
In the middle inscription, the words: "He that followeth me... Shall have the Light of Life." (Saint John 3:12).

Inscriptions on books -

Trinity Chapel is a separate structure, located on the northwest corner of the church property. The window receives its light from the west, and is subject only to the afternoon sunlight. The tabernacle crucifix just enters the sloping sill and base of the window.

Five other windows of the same size, two on the north and three on the south side, make this a well lighted chapel. The present windows consist of a very light amber glass, glazed in diamonds; there are no windows on either side of the "Altar" window, it being the only window giving light to the auditorium of the chapel on the west wall."

Inscription: "For life's own fountain is within thy presence, and in thy smile we have the light of life". (from the Moffat translation). (See letter from Mrs. Deems, Jan. 27, 1944). (Psalm 36, verse 9)

This design is conceived as a great symbol, in color and light, of Christian inspiration and devotion.

The growing foliated vine* forms the pattern of the background and blossoms in fleur-de-lis of truth and purity, outlining and supporting the open books inscribed with the significant texts from the ninth verse of Psalm Thirty-six, "For life's own fountain is within thy presence" -

"and in thy smile we have the light of life." (from the Moffat translation). **

The dominant central figure of Christ the Light of the World, bearing the lamp of truth, confirms this statement not only in His brilliant presence but in the very colors of His garments. Ruby has been the traditional color symbol of divine love, white stands for purity, and gold is the color of heavenly achievement.

The entire design is alive with colorful implications of brilliant promise and the blue of the wide border, suggesting heavenly contemplation, and passages of green, suggesting youth, springtime and the confirmation of things to come, are combined to emphasize the vertical and ascending movement, through the central passages of gold and silver.

The third open book at the base is planned to receive the memorial inscription.
