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blue-prints, have given me some ideas about subject-matter too.

For example, the reference to Annie Laurie and the dates associated with her name, are a reminder that at her time the Scotch people were devoted to Psalms. I have a book before me now called "The Scottish Psalter" from which, no doubt, Annie Laurie sang these psalms, mostly in paraphrase set to tuneful music.

Falms, and possibly a popular Scottish hymn as subjects for the windows, with, perhaps, a dominating window devoted to the simple goodness implicit, say, in the twenty-fifth chapter of Saint Matthew, - a great favorite with Scotch Presbyterians, as with thoughtful folks everywhere.

Davis wrote Jan. 21,1942: "The WeerKirk will probably have only minor revision s.

Letter of April 13,1942 to Eaton.

I have already made some experiments in color schemes related to your suggestions about the Nee Kirk of the Heather, and as I write this I am wondering whether I should send them on to you, or walt and take them with me.

They are rather free and easy water color arrangements, both founded on the Psalms, which, as I have already told you, would make not only excellent subjects in themselves for those windows, but would also be related to the Scotch traditions of the Church itself.

The chancel window would be the first problem, but should be seen before serious development undertaken - 2 lancet window over altar - east - considerably shadowed by neighboring wing 8 feet away. Present footage: 30 Whole chapel: 65 feet deep Chancel: 20 feet deep.

There are 4 nave windows on the south - double lancets, of which nothing has been said, as yet.
