Description of designs. Whey are devoted to the story of the Good Samaritan in four episodes: - first, the unfortunate man fallen among thieves who have beaten and robbed him and are here symbolized as fleeing with their booty; second, the passing of the Priest and the Levite; third, the administration of the Good Samaritan (his beast above); and fourth, their arrival at the inn where the man is being cared for.

In the smaller panels of the ventilators below are symbolized the four principal Acts of mercy, as so eloquently set forth by St. Matthew in the 25th chapter of his Gospel: - first, "I was an hungred, and ye gave me meat"; second, "I was thirsty, and ye gave me drink"; third, "I was naked and ye clothed me"; and fourth, "I was a

stranger, and ye took me in." Growing vine forms enrich the field and outline the medallion shapes. They suggest the grape and symbolize the unity of the church - "I am the Vine, ye are the branches."

Spaces for short memorial inscriptions are left at the base of each panel.
