General Information Windows to be in the west end of the chapel, and the present choir passes by them every Sunday. The windows are to be in memory of the donor's father who for many years served in the choir.
She wishes to have choir boys in one and a crucifor in the other.
The present windows in the church have "long Gothic figures and gorgeous deep tones. The hope is that something in keeping with these be made."

**The Design for Window at the West End of the Chancel,
Saint Paul's Cathedral,
Buffalo, New York.**

This window is designed in significant recognition of the devoted service of the Choir, past and present.

In the panel at the left is represented the Crucifer; with two choristers bearing open books in the right panel. They are designed in ecclesiastical setting of architectural "canopy", a type of enrichment created and used so effectively in many windows of the ancient cathedrals.

The deep rich accents of pure ruby, blue and purple insure a rich colorful effect, while the silver and gold of the canopy provides sufficient illumination to avoid a somber effect.

The ribbons designed in the base provide space for the memorial inscription.
