General Information There are 2 pair of double windows - casements; and a door 2'8" wide x 3'3" high - all facing south. (This is correct - 2/27/47).

Mr. Cowles may want to show the donor the color sketch for the Huntington Av. Y. windows; and photos of Cincinnati Y. Stamford, Southboro.

~~The idea is to have 4 symbols - the subjects of the Y.M.C.A. - Body, Mind and Spirit, plus their important activity - Social Work. and in the door, the Y.M.C.A. symbol.~~

Mr. Adams spoke of four horizontal divisions in the window frames which are made of wood. We should look into this to make sure that no additional cost will be involved in their removal.

For addresses of those to be notified as window progresses, see other side.

Feb.27,1947. Left sketches with Mr. Cowles. "He was very much pleased, and he is going to see if he can find anyone who can suggest other symbols than the open door for social service, and also possibly other symbols for the objects of the Y.M.C.A. He would also like to include in the lower part of the windows little symbols of the 5 branches of the armed services: - army, navy, coast guard, marines, and air force."

Feb.19,1948. Made changes in the design, introducing the symbols of the four branches of our armed services, and sent to Mr. Roland F. Adams.

June 24,1948. The Navy and Marines to occupy one pair of openings, the Army and Air Force another; and the Coast Guard in the door. (See three new illustrations of the new Air Force insignia in folder. (Take care of these and return to Mr. Adams. We are to insert other additional little religious symbols, such as we had originally planned - the dove, lion, lamp and open book,etc.
