There are at present two horizontal and two vertical wooden
muntins that can easily be removed. These will be removed by a

Child in her arms, recalling her dream that she so held the Holy Infant. Above is the Star of Bethlehem, indicating her associations and influences there.

In the principal medallion below, she is represented writing for children. Smaller medallions suggest the colored children with whom the Sisters worked; and a Chinese Sister of the Transfiguration.

Mother Harriet holds the book inscribed with the cross, and above her is the Anchor of Hope, her special attribute.

The dominating medallion symbolizes the nursing of yellow fever patients during the epidemic at Memphis; and smaller symbols are related to the work with mountain girls of Tennessee and wayward girls of New York.

The surrounding field is enriched with stars of divine steadfastness.
