General Information Door panels, set flush with the wall, hinged outward, with
leaded panels in them, - with some simple design, blues and perhaps
ambers and touches of ruby.
Hinges to be at the outsides.

The book the niche is to house is to be 11 1/2 inches by 15 inches, so the
niche should be 28 inches by 36 inches, or even a little higher, if the
proportions work out better. The opening would have a Gothic head

The book will be sometimes set in there open at a slant.
Carpenters will send the new doors here so the glass can be installed in
them.

We have completed the rough design for the door panels for the niche to hold the memorial book, and we are sending it to you herewith.

The scale is one inch, and we have kept to the size of twenty-eight inches wide by thirty-six inches high.

The pair of adoring angels constitute a more elaborate design than had first been in my mind, but I am sure it will make a lovely enrichment, and we are willing to hold to our first suggestion of one hundred dollars, although it will undoubtedly cost us considerably more than that to make them.
