General Information Chapel seats 20 people.
They want this small window to be of a fineness - both in quality and
craftsmanship - that nothing less will ever be installed. Church is
of modified Gothic architecture - see print in folder.

Window to have angel of Ptáise or prayer such as the vestibule window in
Concordia Lutheran Church, Louisville. Also work into the design a
phoenix bird. (Suggest each idea in an alternate design).

Mr. Stubblefield wrote: "I had thought of the depth of red and the richness
of blue throughout with a figure such as in the window of the Concordia
Evangelical Lutheran Church at Louisville.

"The window over the altar is devoted to the angel of prayer with ruby wings suggesting the choir of the seraphim, nearest the throne of God. In the medallion below is the censer also symbolizing prayer." (2-inch scale). (Since this design is in 2-inch scale, it should be kept in mind, for the pieces of glass would appear smaller and more jewel-like in the reduced scale.)
