General Information "To have symbols of the Eternal Life. Lilies, The Easter
Cross, a Butterfly, or the Pomegranate could be worked into a lovely
little window there.

These should be kept light as they illuminate the stairs.

(We suggested an appropriation of about \$400 each for the 2 larger ones with
the cusped heads, and \$150 each for the smaller ones. — 10/28/52)

"...it should be kept brilliant and luminous. As suggested, we have represented symbols of eternal life, a cross from which spring white lilies of purity, and the butterfly of immortality."

(I think the corresponding window might include another form of the cross, perhaps the anchor cross of hope, with the rose of Divine love and the pomegranate.).

Note: The Chapman window (Cross and Lilies). Take out the butterflies, replacing them with another pair of lilies. Reduce the white areas as much as possible, and emphasize the other colors.

Make the design for the opposite window, East, which will be called the Borcas window, and the inscription will read, "Dorcas Memorial Window, 1954".

This will be another form of the cross - the anchor cross of Hope, with the rose of Divine Love, and the Pomegranate. The latter would balance the position in the other window now occupied by the butterflies.

We are sending you the color sketches for the two northern windows.

The butterflies have been removed from the Chapman Memorial, and the areas of white somewhat reduced, although I still think these little panels should be brilliant and luminous to avoid darkening the area near them.

The anchor cross of Hope and roses of Divine Love are roughly suggested for the balancing panel, in a warmer palette.

The inscriptions are indicated in both.

We think these designs will work out beautifully in the color and light of the actual glass.
