General Information Keep in mind the Saint John's Seminary windows, Brighton,
but narrower border and one symbol placed in the upper part, with perhaps
just an echoing spot or simple symbol below. The general idea is to represent
the seven Sacraments with two aspects of the Blessed Sacrament.
The windows should have quite light fields and symbols of rich but
translucent colors. - all with a classic or renaissance feeling.
There are German figure windows in the clerestory, big subjects filling the
whole space, - Renaissance borders and ornament, -
The windows should not be similar to the clerestory windows, but should take
them into account, producing what might be called a harmony of contrast.

We have enjoyed our study of a typical
wave window for the Church of the Blessed
Sacrament, and we are sending you the color
sketch herewith.

Of course you will understand that it is a
rough presentation of the general theme, with the
idea of suggesting color and light in action. All
of the exquisite detail of line and form is left
to the full sized drawings, and the actual glass.

We have kept in mind the general plan of the
Chapel windows of Saint John's Seminary in Brighton,
with a very light field of silver and gold, supporting
a dominant upper medallion and a secondary one below.
We believe this to be a better arrangement for these
particular windows than the more evenly balanced
medallions at the top and bottom as in the Saint
John's Seminary windows.

Around the field and medallions is a wide border
of full color, designed in a conventional rose
pattern, suggesting one of Our Lady's symbols and the
red rose of Divine Love.

We have in mind an alternating color scheme
through the series, contrasting blues with rubies
in the fields of the medallions and through the
border, with other minor color changes which will
add interesting variety throughout the group without
destroying an overall harmony.

With the idea of devoting these windows to the
Sacraments, we have thought to represent Baptism in
this sketch. Through the decorative fields are the
shell symbol of Baptism, and the dominant medallion
represents Christ as the moving spirit of the
Sacrament, with the baptismal font at one side, and
Saint John the Baptist at the other.

This theme of Christ's own baptism by John is
further emphasized through the descending Dove in the
lower medallion.

In the base we have suggested a significant text
from Saint Jerome "All sins are forgiven in Baptism".

This and other details of symbolism and subject-
material may be changed in the process of unifying and
correlating the entire group of windows; but I think
the present sketch will serve to indicate our thought
for the general enrichment of this group of eight
windows.

Important: Mr. Heffernan
reminds us that the border
wants to be formal, no
implication of Gothic in it,
and there will not be the
Biblical text. There will
be a small memorial
inscription at the base.
Study the rest of the
medallions.

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Designs for the Lower Range of Windows,
Church of the Blessed Sacrament,
Jamaica Plain, Massachusetts.

In continuing the development of the designs for the lower range of windows for the Church of the Blessed Sacrament, Jamaica Plain, we have prepared a suggestion for the alternating color scheme, with ruby appearing in the areas where blue was indicated in the first typical design, and a grape motif in the border, contrasting with the rose pattern of the first design.

Baptism

It is our thought to arrange these windows, devoted to the *wireline not steel across* *T.M.*
Sacraments, in the order of the Way of the Cross, beginning with the first typical design which symbolizes Baptism, and represents Christ as the moving spirit of the Sacrament, with the baptismal font at one side and Saint John the Baptist at the other. The shell of Baptism is represented in the lower medallion, also enriching the field at regular intervals.

Confirmation

The second window is devoted to Confirmation, with Christ Himself administering the Sacrament. Heavenly rays with the flame of divine seal descend on the figure in white. Flames again appear through the field, and the lower medallion represents the descending dove of the Holy Spirit.

Holy Eucharist

The third window, devoted to Holy Eucharist, represents Christ as the Celebrant, with the Chalice and Host. Above the communicant is the symbol of the grape. At the base is again the symbol of the Chalice and Host, with the Chalice repeated through the field.

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Penance

In the window representing the Sacrament of Penance, Christ blesses the kneeling penitent in the window devoted to that Sacrament, while the ~~scutum~~ keys form the lower and background symbols.

Extreme Unction

Our Lord administers Extreme Unction, while the little symbol of the altar bears the candles and cross, the latter being the motif through the field and in the lower medallion.

Holy Orders

A book implying the Gospels and learning serves as a significant symbol in the medallion of Ordination, while the mitre is the secondary symbol.

Matrimony

Our Lord, uniting a couple in Holy Matrimony, bears the symbolic ring, while entwined rings are represented as the significant symbol below.

Prayer

The last window is devoted to the theme of Prayer, with two figures kneeling before the vision of Our Lord. At the base, an angel of prayer bears a censer, - the censer motif repeating through the field.
