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Mr. Eggers gave Mr. Skinner a sheet of suggestions for the theme of the Chapel windows prepared by Mr. Day, who has just died. He was very well thought of, and he would like to incorporate his plan as much as possible.

We are to keep these windows light and brilliant, so that the interior would not be somber. Mr. Eggers thinks the side chancel and choir windows can be kept very simple, and with no particular significance, - concentrating on the eight nave windows. The following is Dr. Day's proposal for subjects.

Apr. 24, 1951. wrote Mr. Eggers...pleased to have you say that it may be possible to introduce animals and birds to symbolize great truths and principles...This will give us much more freedom in suggesting ideas such as Courage and Peace, for which the lion and dove have been the traditional symbols; although we might have accomplished our purpose through such symbols as the flame and the olive branch. Again, Humility is a difficult quality to symbolize. Although the violet is the traditional symbol of Modesty, and the yoke of Submission, the lamb is more representative of Humility. It is out wish to design these windows in compositions suggesting the millefleur patterns of mediaeval tapestries, introducing medallions devoted to the great principles of upright living that Dr. Day has suggested. These principles can be set forth in significant texts from celebrated authors in the base of each lancet, and symbolized in the medallions above. We would keep the fields of the windows in quiet low-toned over eall pattern, slightly accenting the medallions. They would admit an abundance of light, assuring pleasant illumination. The color and pattern would be varied throughout the group, introducing harmonious variations of the dominant theme."

We have in mind a palette dominant in golden tones. (May 11,1951).
