 We might include some small suggestion of the Scotch course of Presbyterianism*
 General Information They believe that the triple apse window should have the
 richest color, with the side chancel windows next, and the nave windows
 admitting the most light, altho Rector feels that the aisle window sketches are a
 little light and insistent in comparison with the chancel.
 They are planning to have 4 carved wooden figures in the reredos, from left to
 right, Thomas, Peter, John and Paul. Designer, Leslie H. Nobbs, 536 Madison Av., N.Y.

They plan to divide the chancel window into panels, or medallions, all related
 to the Passion, Resurrection and Ascension.

In the base of the first lancet, would be Christ's appearance to Thomas after
 the Resurrection, with the rest of the Apostles in the background. In the
 base of the central lancet, his appearance to Mary Magdalene, and in the third,
 Peter and John arriving at the Empty Sepulchre.

In the second tier, (John 21:2) Jesus' appearance to 7 at Galilee,

*such as the Thistle.

"I go afishing, etc"; the center, the Breaking of Bread at Emmaus; the third, his appearance to the Disciples when the doors were shut, (John 20:19).

In the third tier, Stephen's vision of Christ at his martyrdom; and in the middle, Christ's appearance to 500 at one time. Create the appearance of a crowd by a few figures and a suggestion of a lot of heads behind them. In the third panel, Paul's Conversion on the Damascus Road.

At the top of the central panel would be the Ascension, with Angels in the heads of the side panels, looking up and gesturing toward the Ascension, with rays of light coming down from the Ascension toward Stephen and Paul.
