General Information This window goes opposite Saint John, and next to Ruth.
(This is the last of the nave windows).

Subject to be King Solomon, with tools - the theme being building of the
Temple.

The Committee likes the design of the U.S. Naval Academy King Solomon,
adapted, of course, for their opening. They would like to include building
tools such as plumb, square, level, etc - and possibly drafting equipment.

The Committeeman says "the only other comment I would make is that the
Bible story says: 'There was neither hammer nor ax nor any tool of iron
heard in the house while it was in building'."

We have completed our study of the design for the King Solomon window and are sending you the color sketch, herewith.

Solomon is crowned and holds the model of the temple, and the sceptre surmounted by the six pointed Star of the Old Testament. Carpenters' tools are indicated in the field, - the square, a plumb bob, and an early type of hammer. We will avoid tools of iron.

In the medallion below, Solomon directs the building of the temple, with the text, - "Solomon built the house, and finished it." 1 Kings 6:14.
