One is devoted to the Reformers, third from the chancel on the north side, arranged in chronological order. John Wycliffe holds the open book inscribed for the Old and New Testaments in recognition of his translation. Martin Luther has the pen and book of his writings; while John Calvin holds the scroll symbolizing his "Institutes of the Christian Religion". The book inscribed with the Flame held by John Knox suggests his "History of the Reformation", while the chain symbolizes his supremacy over his Church, Saint Andrew's, was taken over by the French.
