Upper portion of window is exposed to direct light, while lower portion is shaded by a porch roof which goes through the window and divides it. The wood bar must remain.

MAKE NEW SKETCHES USING TWO SYMBOLS IN EACH

..... Matthew and Mark symbols in one

..... Luke and John symbols in other

..... Rev. Alkins in letter of Dec. 4th "I should like to have the names of the Evangelists included"

I think the best solution of the lighting problem is to feature a colorful symbol in the upper portion, with a field in the general character of your five chancel panels and windows opposite the chancel, continuing this field through the lower portions to include the shaded and ventilator section.

We have prepared a rough color sketch to indicate how this works out, with Saint Paul's traditional symbol of the Book and Sword, not only of his martyrdom, but the Sword of the Spirit. Another of Saint Paul's symbols could be kept in mind to balance it in the companion window. The lower part would, of course, go into deeper shade, but we would use lighter glass in this portion, using textures that would catch and reflect as much illumination as possible. The ventilator would be included at the base. The window can be beautifully designed in this manner at a cost of twelve hundred dollars, delivered to you.
