We believe we can undertake the window in this manner at a cost of seven thousand, four hundred dollars. Of course it could be simplified, for instance, in the grapevine borders, reducing its cost, but I am confident we would all regret the loss of the rich mosaic quality. We have in mind a window comparable to your lovely rose, but very different in view of its comparatively low and intimate position.

The cost could very well be divided into three units, with the side panels at two thousand dollars each, and the central one, three thousand, four hundred dollars. This would include the portions of the triangular shape at the top.

O.E.S.report: They want a window with the red to predoming blues, with the Christ figure in red. Also the background background of the medallion. Very little orange and ruby colors of both the rubies and the blues. Change the angel with praying hands. Eliminate censer and have flowing the sketch to them.
