This is to be the elaborate medallion type - and to be devoted to
David and Solomon, with incidents from the life of each *AS FOLLOWS:*
Upper left: David plays harp before Saul I Samuel 16:23.
Lower " David Anointed by Samuel I Samuel 16:13
Upper right: Solomon Builds the Temple. I Kings 6.
Lower " Solomon's Wise Judgment (of Babes) I Kings 3:16-27

Rector writes: "I would like to stay with the cool greens and yellows
(in this window) without completely, of course, omitting the blues
which are so beautiful in the other windows we have." Because of the light
in the church.

The next one, completing the east side, is devoted to Kings David and Solomon.

In the lower medallion David is anointed by Samuel; with his father, Jesse and one of his brothers in the background.

Above, David plays before Saul in his dark mood.

In the field are his crown as King of Judah, the great sword which he took from Goliath, and again, the six pointed Star. Below is the sling and five stones.

Opposite is symbolized Solomon's wise judgment between the mothers; and the building of the Temple, with the architect and builder bringing plans and material to him. A vision of the Temple is seen above.

In the field are the King's sceptre and the scroll of Proverbs, and at the base, the altar with burning incense offered to the Lord three times a year.

Again, the palette emphasizes cool greens and golds.
